President's Report



The Queensland volleyball community returned to courts around the state in 2022, all with the fervent hope that we had the COVID-19 pandemic well behind us. Volleyball Queensland (VQ) membership increased to a new record 11,972 members (11,383 members in 2021) with a total of 36 affiliate clubs and associations. All the 11,972 registered members of VQ are members of our affiliates and clubs as well as thousands of school students from around Queensland who participate in our Schools Cup events.

VQ welcomed eight new affiliates in 2022:

- Clovers Volleyball Club (Logan)
- Mackay Volleyball Mavens (Mackay)
- Marsden Volleyball Club (Logan)
- Morayfield Volleyball (Morayfield)
- Moreton Bay Volleyball Club (Moreton Bay)
- Outreach Volleyball Community Club (Brisbane)
- Southern Brisbane Volley Strikers (Brisbane)
- West Brisbane Volleyball (Brisbane)

The VQ Schools Cup series of events continue to grow in popularity:

- VQ Primary Schools Cup had 191 teams from 26 schools (145 teams from 22 schools in 2021);
- VQ Junior Schools Cup had 224 teams from 81 schools (210 teams from 75 schools in 2021);
- VQ Intermediate Schools Cup had 216 teams from 84 schools (217 teams from 75 schools in 2021);
- VQ Senior Schools Cup had 260 teams from 121 schools (185 teams from 94 schools in 2021); and
- VQ Beach Schools Cup had 348 teams from 51 schools (430 teams from 50 schools in 2021). The event was
 rescheduled to a later date due to flooding in southern Queensland;

Queensland again won the Australian Youth Beach Volleyball Championships in Coolangatta and retained the President's Shield (formerly the Andy Burdin Shield) for the 8th consecutive year. Queensland also retained the President's Cup with a dominant display at the Australian Youth Volleyball Championships in Bendigo. Queensland also performed strongly at the Australian Junior Volleyball Championships and the Australian Junior Beach Volleyball Championships.

There continues to be significant growth in the number of youth and junior age athletes now playing for our affiliates and clubs in formal competitions such as State Championships, the Queensland Beach Volleyball Tour and the Junior Premier Volleyball League. The development of our youth and junior volleyball athletes by our affiliates, clubs, our Queensland Elite Development program and our State Junior programs supports the enormous work done by the schools to identify and develop these volleyball athletes. The challenge we all have is to provide these athletes with quality volleyball experiences into the future.

The Volleyball State Championships at the Gold Coast Sports and Leisure Centre had 180 teams participating across multiple divisions (145 teams in 2021). Elite Volleyball Club won the Presidents Shield with a strong performance across both the open and the junior divisions.

Entries in the Queensland Beach Volleyball Tour (QBVT) grew to 1663 over 15 events from Cairns to Coolangatta (902 teams in 11 tournaments in 2020/21). Declan Tiso and Thomas Heijs won the Men's Premier Division of the Tour Championship and Kayla and Brianna Mears won the Women's Premier Division of the Tour Championships. The QLD Open was a feature round held at Mooloolaba with 196 teams across all divisions. The QLD Open champions were Caitlin Bettenay and Stefanie Fejes in the Women's division and Declan Tiso and Thomas Heijs in the Men's division.

The Premier Volleyball League (PVL) team entries grew by 30% to 227 teams in both the senior and the junior divisions. The continued growth in Junior PVL is particularly pleasing as we engage school age players and build the important links to our affiliated clubs.

The 2022 Comet Ridge Queensland Country Championship (QCC) was held in Townsville with 25 teams (36 teams in 2021 in Bundaberg). Townsville Monsoons won both the Men's and Women's Division 1 Championships as well as the overall Champion Club at the QCC.

2022 saw the return of the Australian Volleyball League and the Queensland Pirates teams performed strongly throughout the season and both teams qualified for the finals held on the Gold Coast. The Pirates women won the national title with a controlled and dominant performance while the Pirates men could be considered somewhat unlucky with close defeats in both finals. I thank our loyal Pirates sponsors, including our clothing sponsor Game Clothing and Pivotal Motion Physiotherapy for their continued support while welcoming Iona College to the program.

On behalf of the Board, I sincerely thank the VQ and QLD Elite Development Program staff for their professionalism, dedication, and commitment - Gary O'Donnell, Damien Searle, David Stokes, Catherine Birch, Jason Matulick, Nathan Dang, Nicci Grace, Connor O'Neill, Kelly Coomber, Chris Todd, Dean Bielanowski, Jill Kelly, and Kent Scotney. Gloria Vicario and Jacqui Edgar left VQ during 2022 to pursue other professional opportunities. Chris Todd also departed for Sydney to take up a senior position with Volleyball NSW. We thank them for their contributions and wish them well in the future.

I thank my fellow Board members for their important contributions to the Board and their endless energy and commitment in steering the strategic direction of volleyball in Queensland. Unfortunately Shaun Scott resigned from the Board due to personal reasons in 2022. I take this opportunity to thank Shaun for his strong contributions to the Board over recent years. Shaun's professional experience in the business sector was invaluable to the strategic considerations of the Board. Shaun also brought a particular focus on developing better processes and procedures in VQ which are both effective and transparent. Shaun will continue to contribute to both VQ and Volleyball Australia in his many coaching roles. During 2022, the Board appointed Kristan Conlon and Sharon Hinton to fill vacant Board positions. Kristan has a well credentialed legal career as well as substantial links with various stakeholder groups across the broader community. Sharon returns to the Board and brings her high-level business development and stakeholder engagement skills and experience particularly with government and the tertiary education sector. Both Kristan and Sharon have represented QLD as players and coaches and bring an understanding of the volleyball environment as well as their professional skills and experience to the VQ Board.

I also wish to acknowledge the important contributions made by members of the following Board sub-committees: Queensland Beach Volleyball Committee; VQ Schools Committee; Queensland Volleyball Referee Committee. The Board also seeks the counsel of the Presidents' Commission, made up of interested club presidents, on specific matters.

The Queensland Government continues to support VQ through Active Industry Fund. Our organisation could not operate without the generous support of the Queensland Government, which continues to set the national benchmark in supporting the sports industry and in particular, the community sport sector. I would also like to acknowledge the continued support we receive from the Volleyball Australia, Mikasa, Queensland Academy of Sport and the City of Gold Coast.

I look forward to seeing you on the court.

Finance Director's Report



Volleyball Queensland reported a net surplus of \$291,024 for the 2022 financial year. This is a consistently strong surplus following on from last year's surplus of \$355,457.

The key highlights of the financial report which have contributed to this result are as follows:

- A return to full participation in all aspects of the national volleyball calendar saw total revenue increase to \$2.7m;
- Participant contributions increased from \$1,222,456 to \$1,846,347, an increase of 51%. This demonstrates the continued expansion of all competitions operated by VQ;
- Tournament and competition-related expenses increased from \$644,236 to \$922,313, an increase of 43% being the necessary increase in event labour, venues and representative teams travel costs;
- Administrative and employee expenses are significantly higher, comprised of an increase in office headcount
 with salary increases tracking inflation, filling the Pathways Manager position, the new Education &
 Participation (Referees and Coaching) position and the Administration Manager position, implementation of
 Office 365, increasing membership insurance, development of the Majestri membership platform and
 remittances to Volleyball Australia;
- Membership revenue reached a record high of \$425,903 almost double that of 2 years ago.

Our net equity increased to \$1,086,666. For the first time in my time 14 years as Treasurer, the Board invested \$500,000 in interest bearing bank securities. This is intended to deliver a low-risk passive income while we decide on other potential uses of our retained funds – a strategy we will expand on when appropriate. The Board also approved a number of essential capital purchases during the year such as competition equipment, new office furniture, and replacement of the retired VolleyVan.

Demand for VQ events is bursting at the seams, particularly in Beach and Indoor Schools Cup, PVL and Junior PVL, representative teams and beach events. VQs greatest challenge in 2022 will continue into 2023 – finding and retaining the people and venues to power this insatiable demand. Venue capacity and cost is a major driver in the increase in nomination costs this year, as rates are increasing beyond inflation.

I would like to congratulate Gary and the administration team for their extraordinary effort in 2022, delivering a suite of events which have received resounding approval from our membership. The Board acknowledges the immense demand on the executive and have sought, with Gary, ways to increase staffing to sustain our expanding footprint.

Thanks are extended to our affiliates and schools clients who have coordinated their growing team entries, club administration and financial obligations in a prompt fashion. We appreciate your co-operation and dedication.

The Board is looking for opportunities to expand our offerings with newer and larger venues when they become available, coordinating with the Queensland Government and Olympic planning authorities. It is an exciting time for Volleyball Queensland, as we enjoy financial stability, domestic growth and interstate dominance.

General Manager's Report



I closed my report to the members at the 2021 Annual General Meeting with a somewhat reflective remark;

And so we progress to 2022, knowing our friend COVID lurks in the shadows, nevertheless the tremendous resolve and interest in our great sport that our participants exhibit will win out, the delivery challenge awaits!

Indeed, as the year progressed that 'interest in our great sport' was well and truly evident! COVID was a factor and while remaining a deadly concern for the community, led by our health experts and through personal care and discipline in enacting COVID safe delivery, together the sport largely went ahead without 'blanket cancellations' instead selective standing down of individuals and rescheduling became the operating 'norm'. With that, the borders opened and so players, teams, coaches and match officials could fully engage the sport's representative program.

2022 therefore became a year where Volleyball Queensland could 'return to normal' and so 2022 was akin to 2019, the year before COVID struck where the sport was played freely across the country.

It is this context that I look at what 'interest in our sport' was in 2022 as compared to 2019, the highlights of which are:

And so to all those who facilitated that 'interest in our sport', whether you are; the players, parents, school coordinators, club leaders, coaches, match officials thank you! Delivering the sport while it is experiencing a phenomenal period of growth was not simply a matter of 'good luck', it was and is requiring of hard work, enthusiasm, love for and commitment to the game and those who engage in it.

Volleyball Queensland completed and then released its 2025 Strategic Plan on the occasion of the Annual General Meeting in 2022 to guide the work of the organisation. The Strategic Plan will help focus the operational imperatives for the organisation and so distribute time and effort into not only the 'right now' items such as 'this week's entries or draws' but to the capability items which will benefit the sport in the longer term, such as modernising systems associated with membership & competitions or inputting to venue design for the legacy facilities which will come from Brisbane 2032.

Finance Director Russell Egan advises in his report on the strong financial performance of the organisation, while we 'have done well' we must be vigilant and diligent in our work. Earlier in my report, I reflected on 2019, that year and the year before were effectively 'loss years' for VQ and so while the opportunities associated with Brisbane 2032 are sometime away, VQ being well resourced financially to take up options should they arise, need to be at the forefront of our thinking. Consistent with that, the organisation has sought to build its external funding and so 2022 provided increased support from City of Gold Coast and Townsville City Council for events, sponsorship arrangements with Game (Pirates Outfitting), Iona (Pirates Venue), Pillow Talk (QBVT, Beach Schools Cup) & Mikasa (through Volleyball Australia) and via an ever-expanding merchandise program at our feature events.

The Queensland Government's Sport & Recreation Queensland (SRQ) continued its strong support of volleyball through the Active Industry Fund, after seven years of stable support that program will be retired in mid-2023 and so the organisation will need to compete for support within the new funding framework at that time. SRQ in conjunction with Education Queensland initiated a new program in 2022, the 'School Sport Program' which was focused on building sporting pathways within school sport. VQ was successful in its application which will lead to activities in early 2023 with localised Schools Cups across the state, coach & match official training and trialing 'all abilities' activity. SRQ's support has been crucial to the development of the sport and we remain ever thankful of it

Over the year VQ staff worked extensively with their Volleyball Australia 'equivalents' through a range of programs including; the coach and referee accreditation system, the sweep of the Australian Championships in which Queensland teams competed, sharing equipment and coordinating setup with Australian Beach Tour events in Queensland, collaborating on the 'new' Sport Integrity framework, National Insurance Program, National Participation program, National Charter and a package of support funding for Volleyball Australia to facilitate provision of services which VQ utilises. I acknowledge and thank Volleyball Australia staff for their efforts over 2022.

To meet the sport's delivery challenges, the VQ core staff team expanded over the year, and I thank them for their dedication and resolve to facilitate volleyball opportunities to young and old alike!

Finally, I thank the Board for their leadership and support over the year, they commit themselves voluntarily 'to the cause' and are deserved of much praise for all they do on our behalf.

Queensland Junior State Championships

Queensland Country Championships

Volleyball Queensland's 2022 Comet Ridge Queensland Country Championships took place in beautiful Far-North Queensland and attracted an impressive 25 teams across Brisbane, Cairns, Gladstone, Mackay, Redlands, and Townsville. This tournament was hosted at the state-of-the-art Townsville Indoor Stadium and Townsville Indoor Reserve facilities over two massive days, with Townsville Monsoons Volleyball Club crowned Club Champions for the first time.

Queensland Beach Volleyball Tour

The Queensland Beach Volleyball Tour (QBVT) is the highest level of beach volleyball played in the State. The 2021/22 season comprised of 15 tournaments and was presented by 7 promoters (including Easts VC for the first time). Central and North Queensland events also returned, with Townsville, Mackay and Great Keppel Island joining the regular Tour stop at Bundaberg.

This summer featured a total of 776 players (332 male, 444 female), with 1663 entries received over the season. Junior entries grew 96%, with 422 entries cross the u15 & u17 divisions). These numbers would have been even higher except for COVID resulting in numerous last-minute partners switches and withdrawals. On top of this the Coolangatta event was cancelled due to major flooding in the south-east.

For the second successive year 'The Sandpit' Qld Open was impacted; cyclone activity and tsunami warning resulted in major beach loss at Mooloolaba. As a result, the tournament was reduced to just 15 courts (for 196 teams), with 1,500m between courts 1-11 and 12-15. Credit must go to the players for their understanding and adapting to the late changes, and the The Sandpit crew who ensured both venues were well serviced. Also, thanks to Sunshine Coast Council for leveling the remaining sand as best as possible.

Due to the fantastic support of the players, the Bracken Ridge and Sandstorm events were also run across 2 venues, and Kurrawa #2 set a new QBVT record for number of entries with 212 teams competing cross the 2 days of competition.

The Tour culminated in the QBVT Championships and Player Awards. For the record, Kayla Mears/Brianna Mears, and Declan Tiso/Thomas Heijs were crowned Tour Champions.

In the Player Awards Caitlin Bettenay and Declan Tiso were voted Tour MVPs by their peers, while the Best Tournament award was shared by Mooloolaba (by East VC) and Great Keppel Island (by V'Ball in Paradise/TC).

PVL saw a record 122 Teams compete (73 Mens Teams and 49 Womens Teams) across 12 Divisions, whilst JPVL saw an incredible 105 teams (60 Boys Teams and 45 Girls Teams) take the court across the same number of Divisions.

VQ would like to congratulate Dragons Volleyball Association who were crowned Club Champions, after the conclusion of an unforgettable Grand Finals Series played at Gold Coast Sports and Leisure Centre on Sunday 11 September.

VQ would like to thank Kent Scotney (PVL and JPVL Coordinator), Shane Clouston (PVL and JPVL Chief Referee), Venue Managers, Referees and Referee Supervisors, Sports Trainers, Coaches and Managers, Volunteers, Rogue Gun Photography, and most importantly, the players who were part of the largest PVL and JPVL seasons in history!

Beach Schools Cup

The Pillow Talk Beach Schools Cup is the first schools cup of the school year, traditionally played in March but not in 2022. Australian Volleyball League - Queensland Pirates

The Australian Volleyball League (AVL) returned after a 2-year hiatus due to covid-19. Queensland's entrants to the AVL, the Queensland Pirates were eager to play on a national stage after the considerable break. Iona College came on board as a new sponsor of the Queensland Pirates providing their beautiful new state of the art sports precinct the Provence Centre for training and home games. They were also joined by Pivotal Motion and GAME clothing as medical and apparel sponsors. The 2022 AVL season was played from October to December and saw Queensland host 3 home games including a round at Junior Schools Cup on the Gold Coast in October. Finals were hosted on the Gold Coast and both the Men and Women qualified after the regular season concluded. The Men sadly bowed out in their gold medal qualifier and eventually ended up finishing 4th. The Women however won their semi and then the Gold Medal Match to become the 2022 National Champions. Congratulations to the Girls and the coaching team, led by Terry Rudder on a fantastic result. The Pirates wish to thank all volunteers, sponsors and supporters involved in 2022.

Australian Youth Beach Volleyball Championships

Volleyball Queensland's Youth Beach State Teams participate annually in the Australian Youth Beach Volleyball Championships (AYBVC). This tournament attracts teams from all over Australia and is played across five different age groups: U14, U15, U16, U17 & U18. In 2022, all competing states, and the 190 person QLD delegation, descended on the Gold Coast for a week of competitive volleyball in what turned out to be very treacherous weather conditions with strong wind, rain and eventually covid affecting many of the participants. Queensland has a great history at AYBVC and 2022 would prove to be no exception with QLD claiming 6 Gold and 5 Silver Medals. The success on the Medal tally including the U14 Boys who entered 4 teams all placing in the top four positions of the division, led to the President's Cup (previously Andy Burdin Shield) safely returned to QLD.



Australian Junior Volleyball Championships

The newly renamed Australian Junior Volleyball Championships (AJVC) launched in 2022 with a standalone U19's and U23's competition. The last time these divisions were played together at a national championship was 2014 in Canberra. Volleyball Queensland entered 9 teams across the U19 and U23 Men and Women's divisions. Queensland headed to Sydney to compete at Sydney Olympic Park against the other states but were also joined by teams from the United States and New Zealand. Queensland teams excelled, medalling in every division. U23 Men also managed to place 1st and 3rd in their division. Although there is no perpetual trophy for the tournament yet, Queensland's final placings reinforced our dominance at national junior championships.

Australian Youth Volleyball Championships

The newly renamed Australian Youth Volleyball Championships finally went ahead In 2022 after cancellations in 2020 and 2021 due to covid-19. The Youth Championships were held in chilly Bendigo, Victoria across two venues. Volleyball Queensland nominated 20 teams, 40 coaches and 5 support staff to attend AYVC, which is the biggest Queensland delegation that has competed at a national championship. Such a large delegation did not disappoint and excelled across the board. Queensland on finals day appeared in 9 out of 10 Gold Medal Matches and claimed gold and silver medals in U14 Boys and U14 Girls and Gold and Bronze in the U16 Boys. Queensland were also named national champions in the U15 Boys, U17 Boys, U16 Girls and U17 Girls. The President's Cup was awarded to Queensland at the conclusion of the tournament with 31 points. New South Wales was the runner up on 11 points clearly demonstrating the dominance Queensland had on the competition. Queensland U17 Girls Head Coach Nicole Hannan was voted QLD Coach of the Year and was presented this award at the closing ceremony. Congratulations to all athletes, coaches and volunteers involved with AYVC.





Junior Pirates Camp

Volleyball Queensland's Junior Pirates camp managed to go ahead in Autumn and Winter despite the first camp of the year scheduled to be held in January was cancelled due to growing covid cases. The first Junior Pirates Camp of the year was held at The Sports Centre, Boondall with 101 Male and 40 Female athletes in attendance. The next camp on the Calendar was the Winter Pirates camp at Calamvale Community College. This camp had the highest numbers of the year with 111 Males and 50 Females. Camp Head Coaches Angela Gaviglio and Steven Burton effectively delivered a well rounded camp which also coincided with the upcoming Queensland Indoor Youth team trials, which saw various athletes attend as a result of their involvement at Junior Pirates Camp. Thank you to all of the new and returning coaches who participated in the two camps during 2022. Junior Pirates Camp is an excellent resource for new and developing coaches to broaden their skillset and help to shape our Athletes.

Education Report



REFEREE AND COACH DEVELOPMENT

2022 saw a continuation of Volleyball Queensland's commitment to strong referee and coach development at all levels of the sport. The recent growth of volleyball throughout Australia has seen the need for knowledgeable coaches and referees increase and Volleyball Queensland, in partnership with Volleyball Australia, facilitated numerous coaching and refereeing courses throughout 2022 to help meet this need.

The online Level 1 Courses continued to be popular for referees and coaches, providing foundational knowledge in a user-friendly and easy to access format. As in previous years, many Queensland schools organised bulk access to Level 1 Courses for their students in 2022 to upskill their cohort as a group.

Volleyball Queensland also facilitated numerous face-to-face and online Level 2 Coaching and Refereeing Courses throughout 2022. The Level 2 Courses are designed to provide a deeper understanding of many key coaching and refereeing concepts to build on the knowledge gained in the Level 1 Courses and allow many coaches and referees a pathway into higher level activities.

A special mention also to our exceptional Level 2 Coach and Referee Course Presenters who are a huge asset to Volleyball Queensland and are always willing to pass on their knowledge and experience to help others upskill. The feedback from course participants in 2022 was always positive and a reflection of the quality of course presenters in Queensland.

SPORTING SCHOOLS

Throughout 2022, Volleyball Queensland continued its partnership with Volleyball Australia, the Australian Sports Commission, and Queensland schools in delivering Sporting Schools volleyball programs throughout the state. Sporting Schools is a Federal Government initiative designed to increase children's participation in sport and connect them with community sport opportunities. Programs were delivered in many regions, including the greater-Brisbane area, Gold and Sunshine Coasts, as well as in Cairns, Townsville, Gladstone and Gympie.

In total, 54 programs were delivered, with around 4,245 students from prep to year 8 given the opportunity to participate in fun and engaging volleyball skill sessions designed to introduce the fundamentals of the sport while developing valuable interpersonal skills.

Volleyball Queensland would like to thank our hard-working coaches who continue to be a huge asset in facilitating Sporting Schools programs (often at short notice), as well as the many teachers who deliver programs themselves in schools. The passion for improving junior participation rates in volleyball in Queensland is amazing and a real driver for the continued growth of the sport. Looking forward to another fruitful year in 2023!

Communications Report



In February 2022, Volleyball Queensland recognised the need to re-engage with and grow its member base and wider Volleyball Queensland community. To achieve this, a Communications Officer role was re-introduced so that dedicated support could be provided to creating a strategy that would deliver impactful change.

The objectives of this strategy were to:

- Promote and increase participation at Volleyball Queensland events
- Raise the profile of Volleyball Queensland with the wider community and partner organisations (sponsors)
- · Improve sentiment towards, and strengthen, Volleyball Queensland's relationship with its members

This has continued with tactics including:

- · A monthly newsletter sent to members, highlighting achievements and upcoming events
- Planned content schedules for Facebook and Instagram
- Creating regular and engaging mechanisms to encourage two-way communication between Volleyball Queensland and stakeholders and increase interest in upcoming events
- Regular website audits to ensure consistency of branding and the user experience and that information being publicly shared is up-to-date and easily digestible
- Creating Facebook 'events' and dedicated pages for Volleyball Queensland activities

Instagram has been the platform with the greatest increase in engagement and growth with members sharing their images with the Volleyball Queensland account for reposting more widely – our page following grew by 186% from 1779 followers in 2019 to 5115 followers currently.

It is also worth noting that on both Facebook and Instagram, growth has been achieved with predominantly organic content as opposed to paid advertising. Importantly, across both platforms there has been a positive shift in sentiment towards Volleyball Queensland with the organisation viewed and engaged with in a more positive manner by members.

A comparison of key statics for each platform is summarised below:

Planning ahead, the regular monthly plans will continue to drive consistent engagement across both Facebook and Instagram, and the addition of reels will help reach a wider audience and increase the share-ability of content. It will also be valuable to continue working with a professional photographer, and sharing these photos given the centrality of this to our social media success.

The monthly newsletter has seen a distinct growth in engagement with a 94% increase in the open rate since 2020. The unsubscribe option is also seeing positive movement, noting that 'unsubscribe' is not necessarily a negative, as our base is constantly evolving and the primary reason for unsubscribing is athletes/players no longer being involved in volleyball at large. A temporary increase in 'Unsubscribe' will see an upward trend in the other key metric 'open rate' as our base is cleansed.


Moving Forward – a considered approach to engage with our different member segments – research has shown that older people (parents) tend to rely on Facebook and direct communication (emails) while younger people (players/Junior & Senior) will engage on Instagram. Content will be designed with the current trends in mind, utilising Reels, Stories and more traditional posts dependant on the information to be shared. Direct targeted campaigns – across social media and email channels for specific events utilising the segmentation and categorisation of members through our email platform will be beneficial.

Facebook have now converted the VQ page to the updated format 'New Pages Experience'. With this update the 'story' function has been improved, allowing content to be shared in more ways and in keeping with the current trend of how social media is viewed.

A greater emphasis will also be placed on coordinating sponsorship content to ensure deliverables are achieved while still supporting Volleyball Queensland's wider communications objectives in 2023/24.



CAIRNS VOLLEYBALL ASSOCIATION

A Big Year for Cairns Volleyball Association.

2022 has seen CVA grow back towards the levels seen at CVA 5 years ago with growth taking our small venue back to capacity. The year has really been about growing the public profile of CVA and participation and further enhancing the positive culture of CVA. The community of quality people, both on the committee and off the committee has been fantastic.

We now have a venue that is emblazoned as a volleyball venue, a new logo, we have sponsors, have had the first full committee in 5 years and everything is growing too. Thanks to sponsors Cardzilla, Zarraffas and Wellness Embodied for coming on-board in 2022, yes there are more coming.

Wednesday nights' Social and Competitive seasons have grown over the last 12 months from having 7 teams nominate in 2021 increasing to 11 teams ending the competitive season in 2022. Thursdays 'Learn to play' development program continued as a "learn to play program', modelled from 'AFL Auskick', individuals pay and play and don't let down teams if they can't attend whilst individuals develop their skills leading them towards the junior team programs. It is seeing interest from students and adults learning the basics before 'signing up' to compete. Participants have been both local and from as far north as Mossman (60km) and Kuranda (40km) to participate. The activity will no doubt have positive returns into the future with the elementary 'volleyball vibe' being pushed weekly back into schools and will have more young players entering the Wednesday competition at a younger age, with more skills than previous. Mossman has also shown interest to create a CVA hub modelled off the 'Learn to Play' program in their community, we will continue working with them to hopefully get volleyball in the communities surrounding Cairns and growing the game in the region.

The women's and men's representative teams continued to compete in North QLD/ SEQ competitions creating a pathway for athletes. With grass roots being better supported now and more players, CVA representative programs will have more depth to train with and select for competitions going forwards.

CVA has pushed into make beach volleyball a thing in Cairns again with a CVA facilitated competition, with athletes organising 'time and place' competition over 10 weeks that evolved around their schedules (teams negotiate and organise their own referee) which had varied results. The fact CVA pushed into this space is a huge positive. Growing the competitive beach volleyball scene in Cairns should remain at the forefront of CVA going forwards with Cairns having great beach volleyball facility access when compared to that of the rest of the state, let alone country.

CVA with the support of VQ hosted the QBVT Round 4 event, this is a first time for Cairns since 2017 and will be something that CVA is hopeful to continue into the future. Special thanks to those SEQ athletes who 'return the favour' and travel to compete in the far north. Travel for FNQ is the only way to be part of the volleyball family, and we really appreciate you paying your FNQ family a visit.

CVA applied for our first grant since 2016, ticked all the boxes but failed to win the QLD Governments Community Gambling Benefit Fund support, we will try again in the short term.

The Cairns Cup was yet another success with 17 teams nominating, up 80% on local team nominations on the year previous. This again creates a great promotional opportunity to bring more teams into the competition from this annual 'one off' volleyball expo, showing school students volleyball exists outside of school.

CVA has branched out across FNQ supporting Trinity Bay State High School's Academy program, delivering in the indigenous community of Arukun and Cooktown with VQ's support, supported a team of juniors beach volleyball players to compete at the Australian Youth Beach Volleyball Championships on the Gold Coast, and had local athletes represent at the NQ Games and Country Championships.

In 2022 the club had great success with a large number of 'rookie' players with our U19 girls working there way to the semi-finals of the JPVL in their first year.

The club maintains a very strong focus on technical skill development for junior athletes with our rigorous preseason indoor training starting in mid-January for both our U19 and U17's squads. In 2023 the club will be fieldling three girls' teams into the Junior Premier Volleyball League with a view to transition those athletes into a adult divisions over the next few years. Additionally, Clovers has established a niche junior development program for young and aspiring athletes who receive intensive skills development training to enable them to attempt selection into our competitive squads in the future.

In May 2023, Clovers will be undertaking our first annual international tour with two girls squads travelling to Honolulu to compete against some of the best teams in Hawaii and from across the United States. Athletes will also be attending a collegiate recruiting combine and will be taking the opportunity to hit the sand on Waikiki and Queens's beach in Honolulu, the traditional home of Beach Volleyball.

The club has also established an outstanding and very active parent and supporter group who continually raises substantial funds for our athletes for overseas travel and for the club's domestic competition. Additionally, the club has been extremely fortunate to have some amazing sponsors and continued support from Logan City Council.

EASTS VOLLEYBALL CLUB

The 2021/2022 year was, again, an interesting year remembering that this report focuses on the period from 1 July 2021 to 30 June 2022. Not only did we need to continue to deal with COVID but we also had to face floods and rain at the start of the year. On reflection, the minor inconvenience that we suffered is nothing compared to the significant loss that many around the country experienced. However a lot has been achieved within the club over that period. As always, I want to start out by acknowledging the considerable work and commitment of our Management Committee who have done so much work across many aspects of the club.

Key Achievements

At the time of writing this report we already know the outcome of the 2022 **PVL** and **JPVL** Season but that is something that will be covered in next year's report. We had some fantastic outcomes from the 2021 PVL and JPVL season. For the 2022 PVL and JPVL season we have very strong representation in most divisions of the competition with over 250 athletes participating. It's great to see such high numbers involved in this competition.

This year we also implemented a strategy to **build coaching capacity** into the future. We introduced an 'Assistant Coach' for people looking to build their coaching experience. These assistant coaches are allocated to an experienced coach and will be shadowing them throughout the PVL/JPVL season. Our **Junior Training Program** is also continuing to attract reasonable numbers of developing athletes with now 4 training sessions on offer. Offering junior development is really a foundation of the club and continues to ensure that developing players have both opportunity and a pathway to progress within volleyball.

A lot of work was done this year to bring the clubs **Child Safeguarding** policies in line with recent changes at both National and State levels. This involved a considerable amount of work being completed by our newly created Safety Officers, Peter and Christine, as well as the management committee as a whole. As part of that process we introduced a criteria based grading and feedback process for trials that enabled players and parents to see gradings in between trial sessions. These gradings also informed team selections as a step in support of objective and transparent decision making across the club. The overall outcome is a Young Person Safeguarding Strategy supported by behaviours and practices that have now been implemented across the club. Certainly there is more we can do and this will be a continued focus over the coming years.

Having **player representatives** embedded in the Management Committee continues to work well for the club. This is not only about ensuring the player's have a voice in the decisions made by the Management Committee, but also about building capacity in club administration for the future.

We also implemented a new **process for ordering uniforms** by working closely with our supplier. Whilst floods meant that this new process was not as smooth as we had hoped, the new process will certainly make things easier for both the players and the committee in the future.

We enhanced our **social training program** as there was some demand for this program. This lead to the formation of a number of Easts teams being entered in the Pan Pacific Masters Games. Whilst we aim to continue to run this program into the future, we continue to face issues with resourcing it and finding appropriate venues.

We also migrated to a **new IT platform** for managing emails, file storage and collaboration within the committee. This will cost the club a little more going into the future, but provides considerable benefit in the centralisation of key IT needs.

Key Challenges

As mentioned, both COVID and floods impacted club activities over this period. There really is nothing more that needs to be said about this.

At the last Management Committee meeting for this reporting period, a decision was made that a member of the Management Committee should be given the opportunity to resign from their position and to cease involvement in the club. The circumstances are not such that can be included in this report. However a number of flow-on issues are being managed by the executive (myself, Peter as Secretary and Gary as Treasurer). The Management Committee decided to leave that position vacant until the next AGM.

Venues for training continue to be a considerable issue faced by the club. With the growing numbers of both players and clubs within the Eastern region there is a lot of competition around securing venues for training. This is going to continue to be a problem for the club into the future. We have already been informed that one venue will be closed for refurbishment sometime in 2023 as part of the preparations for the 2032 Olympics. We are already trying to take action to secure venues for the 2023 season.

Gary has provided the Annual Finances for the club and these show quite a strong financial position. The main challenge we face relates to outstanding fees. Gary undertakes considerable work managing fee payments throughout the year. However, at the end of each PVL/JPVL season there are large amounts outstanding. In turn, this affects the club's cash flow at the start of each calendar year. Generally the position resolves at the start of the PVL/JPVL season. The club will be considering what action can be taken in 2023 to address this issue.

The club ceased to run the Phoenix League competition, largely due to reduced interest in the competition but also due to some operational issues. Whilst we did find this to be a good competition and we felt that the collaboration with Dragon's Volleyball was valuable on a number of levels, operationally it became too difficult to support. We will look to other opportunities in the future.

Future Activity

As can be seen from the Annual Finances, the club has now reached the threshold where we will need to register for GST again. We had registered when the club originally formed, however, as our turnover at that stage was very low the ATO recommended that we cancel that registration. Gary is taking steps to register for GST again and to change finance processes ensure that they comply with GST requirements.

Whilst we have reviewed and updated our Young Person Safeguarding framework, that framework sits within the overall Member Protection Strategy. Many of the practices within member protection will need also to be revised as part of the regular review process. We are also taking steps to start recruiting coaches for the coming seasons. At the time of writing this report we are prepared to conduct a de-brief of coaches post the PVL/JPVL season aiming to identify areas where we can improve to provide better support and resources for coaches.

Our merchandise is proving popular & following 1 successful grant application, we are already in the mix for another. This will hopefully provide us with umpire stands, new posts and competition playing kits.



OUTREACH VOLLEYBALL COMMUNITY CLUB

2022 is Outreach Volleyball Community Club's (OVC) first year as a Volleyball Queensland affiliate. We took a different pathway to all existing indoor volleyball clubs by placing our full focus towards community engagement and development of new players for adults.

Throughout 2022, we have successfully provided a learning environment that has expanded from one court to seven courts concurrently running once every week – over 100 players coming to play and learn every Sunday. Within the last two years, our Facebook group has grown to over 2000 members.

Our mission aims to provide opportunities to learn and play volleyball within the community for adults. Our success this year are brought forward by the community who make requests for us to support. We have formed new and special sessions that few or no other clubs offer openly:

- Development Squad a 5-week program for players to either learn a position, or focus on core development skills. Many adult players are often disregarded in the competitive environment as they haven't learnt positioning – yet are often not given the opportunity.
- Women's Training and Social Games females in the competitive scene are provided very few places and opportunities to play together at the women's height. Providing these sessions has provided a greater confidence and joy for female players as it is challenging to play against men who naturally have muscular physiques.
- Beginner Training dedicated solely for players who have never played the sport. Many players are intimidated with players who can simply play. It can take many weeks for some players to pick-up the most basic skills. We offer a safe learning environment where adults can learn at their own pace.

Our offerings for the community have included unique events that OVC has including:

- Game Bonanza a monthly event that is simply a round robins' event for teams to play different teams every 30 minutes across three hours. We have scoring and refereeing, but we don't record anything as teams can focus on having fun. Drawing up to (17 teams) 140 players every Game Bonanza.
- Community Clash we often organise community events (big and small) to encourage engagement with other clubs and community groups across Brisbane.
- Outreach Super Smash an annual December event that aims at providing players at 'smashing' every

Overview

In 2022, SDV continued its relationship with Clayfield College as a training centre. Amanda Fielding, in her roles as club affiliate President and coach, also continued to share her diverse experiences as an athlete and coach at a state and international level in Australia, as well as in the NCAA Competition. She worked to build the capacity of parent volunteers and to support coaches in all aspects of organisation and development. It is important to note that the point of difference with SDV is that its sustainability as a Volleyball Queensland club affiliate has its basis in word-of-mouth and invitation through social interaction. That is, SDV does not employ a heavy marketing strategy and has a small social media presence. This means that the teams are often comprised of members who know one another prior to joining. This keeps organisational demands manageable and operational costs low. Unfortunately, the relationship with Clayfield College ended amicably at the end of 2022. More importantly, the culture of fellowship and sharing that has been developed between the emerging athletes and more experienced athletes – who willingly impart their knowledge and expertise of the sport in both disciplines at all levels of competition – is authentic and unique to SDV.

Teams Performance

The 2022 JPVL and PVL Seasons saw mixed results for SDV Teams. The club fielded three (3) teams in the JPVL competition: 1 x U19B Boys (5th); 1 x U17 Girls (9th); 1 x U19 Girls 3rd). The club also fielded two (2) teams in PVL: 1 x Premier Men (6th) and 1 x Division 1 Men (9th). Again, the network of members who are also teachers enabled SDV to strengthen existing and establish new links with schools: Kelvin Grove Secondary College, Burnside State High School, and St Benedict's College. This process expanded to include athletes from Loreto College, Moreton Bay College, Genesis College, Clayfield College, and Kedron State High School. Post-2022 Season Recommendations

As surmised in earlier annual reports, SDV is a sporting association that has significant potential for managed growth as a niche Volleyball Queensland club affiliate, if its core values are preserved. Despite this, the sustainability of such a small-scale sporting organisation continues to be a priority challenge and will always demand sensible and frugal measures to ensure compliant operations and organisational effectiveness. Below are recommendations for 2023.

1. Explore new, mutually beneficial partnership(s) with facilities owners / operators to ensure a consistent and accessible training and competition bases(s). 2. Review merchandising suppliers and options to increase brand exposure and club identity. 3. Continue to implement an EFTPOS service linked to the SDV Bank Account to enable on-site payments for user-pay activities.	4. Host JPVL open trials with a per session payment, but cap JPVL Teams at 2 x Boys and 2 x Girls (max. 10 / team). This will enable a more sustainable use of human (coaches) and material (venue(s), equipment, uniforms / apparel) resources. 5. Focus on school-based teams in JPVL, competing under the SDV name, that are supported by paid personnel (coaches, managers) from those schools.	6. Run a weekly competition to generate a revenue stream and develop a membership base. 7. Focus on offering an integrated sport model – Volleyball and Beach Volleyball – that will enable club members and social participants combines and year-round opportunities to train and compete. This may also require the appointment of personnel responsible for each discipline and the integration of them across an annual development program.

Challenges

Despite attempts to address them, the same constraints that threaten to impede sustainability still include: an aging senior athlete group; the likelihood of coach turnover leading to athlete turnover and attrition; increasing administrative burden on specific committee members; and a loss of identity and relevance in the Volleyball Queensland milieu.

Conclusion

Thanks to the commitment of many who share the same core values, SDV continues to aim to remain a uniquely different sporting organisation. These core values include prioritising friendship, enjoyment, and wellbeing among its members, rather than commercialism and an all-or-nothing approach to competition.

SOUTH BRISBANE WOLVES VOLLEYBALL

The South Brisbane Wolves Volleyball Club is dedicated to providing premier volleyball training and development for junior and senior athletes to compete in club and state competitions in the South Brisbane area. Our goal is to cultivate collective groups of players with a fierce commitment, a healthy competitive spirit, and a positive community both on and off the court. Despite facing challenges during COVID-19 in 2021, we have seen significant improvements in our club culture, as evidenced by our mid-season survey and other testimonials.

In 2022, we proudly showcased our men's program at our show court round against our neighbouring Easts Volleyball Club during the PVL season, purchasing additional promotional footage to elevate our club's culture. We also held our first end-of-season awards night, which had over 150 guests in attendance, including junior and senior players and their families or partners. During this event, we launched our new logo design, which has been well-received by our players and the broader volleyball community.

Our membership grew in 2022, with 21 teams consisting of 174 playing members, approximately 10% more than in 2021. Our playing members span across junior and senior age groups, with the lowest demographic recorded in our women's program. We are encouraged by the commitment of players who drive from as far north as Gympie, as far west as Ipswich, and as far south as Benowa to play at the South Brisbane Wolves. As we continue to see significant growth and expansion, evidenced by over 200 external senior and 200 external junior players trialing for a position at the Wolves in 2023, we aim to provide a premium product to meet the needs of our players.

Our teams achieved positive results throughout the PVL '22 season, with our junior athletes participating in eight medal matches resulting in two gold medals, four silver medals, and two bronze medals. Additionally, we entered teams into various events, including the Dragons Flaming Chalice and the Volleyball Queensland State Championships, where we achieved a 5th place finish out of 24.

We hosted five blocks of Junior Development Programs throughout the year for aspiring juniors wishing to play in the JPVL and several pre-season events for our club community, which were also well-received.

In 2022, the South Brisbane Wolves ventured into the sponsorships and community partnership space, forging strong relationships with community businesses and our local sporting community. We aim to expand this program during the 2023/24 seasons, and we are grateful to our Platinum sponsor FAMASO facilities management and Gold sponsors Bayside Suzuki Marine and Club Southside for their support during the season.

Our club relies heavily on the generosity of numerous committee members, coaches, and managers who go above and beyond throughout the year. Notes to the Financial Statements

For the Year Ended 31 December 2022

The financial statements cover Queensland Volleyball Association Inc. as an individual entity. Queensland Volleyball Association Inc. is a not-for-profit Association incorporated in Queensland under the Associations Incorporation Act (QLD) 1981 (as amended by the Associations Incorporation and Other Legislation Amendment Act (QLD) 2007) ('the Act').

1 Basis of Preparation

In the opinion of the Committee of Management, the Association is not a reporting entity since there are unlikely to exist users of the financial statements who are not able to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy specifically all of their information needs. These special purpose financial statements have been prepared to meet the reporting requirements of the Act.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

Significant accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and are consistent with prior reporting periods unless otherwise stated.

2 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Going concern

The Board of Management have prepared the financial statemetrs on a going concern basis, which contemplates the continuity of normal business activities and the realisation of assets and the settlement of liabilities in the ordinary course of business.

(b) Change in accounting policy

Adoption of AASB 16 Leases

The Association has not adopted AASB 16 Leases as the standard's key changes would have minimum impact on these financial statements.

(c) Revenue and other income

Specific revenue streams

Grant revenue

Grant revenue is recognised in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income when the entity obtains control of the grant, it is probable that the economic benefits gained from the grant will flow to the entity and the amount of the grant can be measured reliably. When there are conditions attached to grant revenue relating to the use of those grants for a specific purposes it is recognised in the balance sheet as a liability until such conditions are met or services provided. Where the grant is for a specific period of time, it is recognised over that period of time.

Membership fees and competition fees

Membership and competition fees revenue is recognised when money is received.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.



Notes to the Financial Statements For the Year Ended 31 December 2022

2 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

(d) Income Tax

The Association is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

(e) Employee benefits

Provision is made for the Association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to be wholly settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled. Long service leave is recognised after 7 years of service.

(f) Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost of inventory is determined using the first-in-first-out basis.

(g) Property, plant and equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment.

Items of property, plant and equipment acquired for significantly less than fair value have been recorded at the acquisition date fair value.

Depreciation

Property, plant and equipment, excluding freehold land, is depreciated on a straight-line basis over the asset's useful life to the Association, commencing when the asset is ready for use.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable asset are shown below:

(h) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

(i) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenue, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

2 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

(i) Goods and services tax (GST) (continued)

Cash flows in the statement of cash flows are included on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which is recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is classified as operating cash flows.

3 Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgments

The directors make estimates and judgements during the preparation of these financial statements regarding assumptions about current and future events affecting transactions and balances.

These estimates and judgements are based on the best information available at the time of preparing the financial statements, however as additional information is known then the actual results may differ from the estimates.

The significant estimates and judgements made have been described below.

Key estimates - provisions

The Association is party to an arrangement with Volleyball Australia for the "We are Volleyball" program. This program has occurred in previous years and the Board of Management expects that the program is likely to exist going forward. The program includes costs for consultants, equipment and insurance. The Board of Management has estimated a provision of \$170,000 which is to be used towards this program. The provision is based on the 2021 budgeted number of members of approximately 7,000 at \$10 each and 2022 budgeted number of members of approximately 10,000 at \$10 each. The assessment of this provision required a degree of estimation and judgement. The Board of Management has estimated this provision based on historical information relating to this program and other related programs. The costs for this program may increase or decrease as members as at 31 December 2022 are at approximately 12,000. As such, future provisions for this program are likely to increase.
