Volleyball Queensland is guided by its elected Board of Management, generating financial resources through a range of activities including competitions, leagues, feature events and corporate partnerships. The organisation is generously supported with grant funding by the Queensland Government.

President's Report



PRESIDENTS REPORT

It was another year of growth for Volleyball Queensland (VQ) events and membership in 2024. VQ membership increased to a new record of 15,203 members (14,071 members in 2023) with a total of 34 affiliate clubs and associations. All the 15,203 registered members of VQ are members of our affiliates and clubs as well as the thousands of school students from around Queensland who participate in our Schools Cup events.

VQ welcomed two new affiliates in 2024:

- Singh Spikers (Logan)
- UniSC (Sunshine Coast)

The VQ Schools Cup series of events continue to grow in popularity:

- VQ Primary Schools Cup series of 5 events had 307 teams from 40 schools (251 teams from 39 schools in 2023)
- VQ Junior Schools Cup had 255 teams from 94 schools (258 teams from 91 schools in 2023)
- VQ Intermediate Schools Cup had 276 teams from 110 schools (276 teams from 103 schools in 2023)
- VQ Senior Schools Cup had 326 teams from 157 schools (292 teams from 137 schools in 2023); and
- VQ Beach Schools Cup had 466 teams from 55 schools (378 teams from 52 schools in 2023). Matches played across 54 courts at Coolangatta Beach

A total of 184 schools participated across the high school Schools Cup events. This is 33% of all high schools in Queensland.

Queensland again won Australian Youth Beach Volleyball Championships in Coolangatta and retained the President's Shield for the 10th consecutive year. Queensland also retained the President's Cup with another dominant display at the Australian Youth Volleyball Championships in the final event in Bendigo. Queensland performed strongly at the Australian Junior Volleyball Championships and Queensland athletes performed very well on the Australian Junior Beach Volleyball Tour. The development of our youth and junior volleyball athletes by our affiliates, clubs and our State Youth and Junior programs supports the enormous work done by the schools to identify and develop these volleyball athletes.

The Mahindra Australian Volleyball Super League was a Field of Gold for the Scape Queensland Pirates with both teams winning the titles against strong opposition. I thank our loyal Pirates sponsors, including our major sponsor Scape, Iona College, VALD, clothing sponsor GAME Clothing and Rogue Gun for their continued support. 2024 was the first year that Queensland has held both the senior and both the youth titles concurrently.

The Queensland Senior State Championships at the Gold Coast Sports and Leisure Centre had 138 teams (115 teams in 2023) participating across multiple divisions (including a Premier Men's division) and the Queensland Junior State Championships had 112 teams (89 teams in 2023) participating across multiple divisions.

Entries in the Pillow Talk Queensland Beach Volleyball Tour (QBVT) were 1426 teams over 13 events from Cairns to Coolangatta (1417 teams in 14 tournaments in 2022/23). Majabelle Lawac and Linline Matauatu (Vanuatu) won the Women's Premier Division of the Tour Championships and Timothee Philippe and Jerome Mak won the Men's Premier Division. The QLD Open had 173 teams across all divisions. The QLD Open champions were Caitlin Bettenay and Phoebe Bell in the Women's Division and Shaun Andersen and Brad Sting in the Men's Division.

The Premier Volleyball League (PVL) team entries grew by 10% to 264 teams in both the senior and the junior divisions. The continued growth in Junior PVL is particularly pleasing as we engage school age players and build the important links to our affiliated clubs.

The 2024 Queensland Country Championship (QCC) was held in Bundaberg with 35 teams (37 teams in 2023 in Toowoomba). Norths won the Women's Championship Division and Men's Division 1 (no Championship Division in 2024). Toowoomba Volleyball Association were awarded the overall Champion Club at the QCC for the second year in a row.

On behalf of the Board, I sincerely thank the VQ staff for their professionalism, dedication, and commitment - Gary O'Donnell, Damien Searle, Catherine Birch, Brady Nicholson, Nathan Dang, Connor O'Neill, Nicci Grace, Jilly Kelly and Kelly Coomber. Ryan Wiegand, our Administration and Services Manager, departed VQ at the end of 2024 to pursue other professional opportunities. Ryan was known by many of our affiliates, and we thank him for his service and wish him and his family well in the future.

I thank my fellow Board members for their important contributions to the Board and their endless energy and commitment in steering the strategic direction of volleyball in Queensland. A number of important strategic partnerships were established in 2024 which will assist VQ to achieve both operational and strategic goals in the future. This includes a research partnership with the University of Queensland that looks at the athlete experience and athlete wellbeing within Volleyball Queensland programs.

I also wish to acknowledge the important contributions made by members of the following Board sub-committees: Queensland Beach Volleyball Committee; VQ Schools Committee; Queensland Volleyball Referee Committee. The Board also seeks the counsel of the Presidents' Commission, made up of interested club presidents, on specific matters.

The Queensland Government continues to support VQ through its Industry Development Program (QSRIDP). Our organisation could not operate without the generous support of the Queensland Government, which continues to set the national benchmark in supporting the sports industry and in particular, the community sport sector. I would also like to acknowledge the continued support we receive from the Volleyball Australia, Mikasa, Game clothing, the City of Gold Coast and Rogue Gun.

I look forward to seeing you on the court.

Treasurer's Report

TREASURER'S REPORT

Volleyball Queensland reported a net surplus of \$365,814 for the 2024 financial year which is a modest improvement to the surplus recorded in 2023 of \$297,469. This resulted in our members' equity increasing to \$1,749,951.

The key highlights of the financial report which have contributed to this result are as follows:

- Participant contributions increased by over 10% (see note 4) which is a combination of competition and representative growth, and closer attention to pricing, maintaining margins reflective of cost increases.
- Passive investments continue to deliver excellent cashflow of \$29,660.
- All other accounting items reported within an acceptable margin range.
- Membership grew from 14,071 to 15,203.
- Staffing costs were stable over the period after accounting for indexation.

Baseline government funding was stable compared to the prior period, however variances reflected in the report are from timing differences when the funding was received and the expiry of special program grants for School Sport and IT purposes. We will endeavour to record this more consistently next year. The biggest concern for the Board throughout 2024 has been VQ's ability to sustain existing services by building a robust, well-resourced workforce.

- The Board commissioned a Human Resource Review to assess the integrity of our employment practices.
- The Board sought survey feedback from the workforce direct to Board members.
- The Board commissioned an operational report by Rowland Consulting which advises on our organisational structure, methods of service delivery and advises on ways to restructure and invest in the organisation for sustained growth.

Given the extraordinary demand for VQ events and representative programs, we rely on the VQ staff for delivery. Staff welfare is the foremost priority. This can be achieved by focusing on clear objectives, a healthy workplace culture and sustainable resourcing. The next phase of strategic planning will potentially see growth within the permanent VQ workforce to service regional demand and seize on commercialisation opportunities.

I thank all VQ affiliates, members and leaders for the continued passion in our sport, and our permanent workforce who go above and beyond at every opportunity to wow our customers with spectacular events, and representative programs.

Not only does Queensland deliver trophies – we deliver first-class events!

General Manager's Report



GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

2024 was a stellar year for the sport in Queensland, bringing with it a remarkable level of on-court success, continued growth in those who seek to engage with the sport by activating a membership, and the number of teams whether club, beach or school who 'take the court' in the competitions and tournaments that Volleyball Queensland offers. And so, what were those headline successes:

- The year may be unique, given Queensland holds all four Australian Champion trophies. The Queensland Pirates Women and Men are the Australian Volleyball Super League Champions, Queensland retained the President's Shield as the Australian Youth Beach Volleyball Champion state, and Queensland retained the President's Cup as the Australian Youth Volleyball Champion.
- Membership through player registration continued the remarkable growth the sport has experienced post COVID with 15,203 signing on - an increase of more than 1,200 from 2023.
- The Queensland Volleyball School's Cups for Beach had 466 teams compete, an increase of 88 over 2023, while the combined entry across the three indoor school's cups was 857 teams, which came from 184 high schools a remarkable increase of 27 school's from 2023.
- The Queensland Junior and Senior State Championships with some 250 teams across the two events grew by a near 50 teams, the Queensland Beach Volleyball Tour had over 1,000 participants during the 2023/24 summer, and Premier Volleyball League surged to a record 266 teams, 25 more than the year before.

These highlighted outcomes are no doubt a way of 'showing success' and represent some of the outcomes of our collective work. A fuller measure, however, needs to embrace our inputs, such as our effort or resources, and then how are we 'going about our work' being our culture or values.

Compared to a 'normal business' a community organisation such as Volleyball Queensland and the affiliated clubs are inherently different, while we are a 'business' and so have need to function with business principles such as compliance with legislation, generate funds to pay our bills, operate in surplus, etc., those that lead the organisation, unlike a business owner who may 'sell up' also have a responsibility as its custodians to ensure its future, to 'pay forward' so another generation of volleyballers will have the opportunity to enjoy our great game. And so to the 'inputs':

First and foremost, it's 'our people'. As I engage across the Volleyball community, I constantly bear witness to Queensland's Volleyballers putting in their best effort, both on and off the court, and so to the players, parents, school coordinators, club leaders, coaches, match officials - thank you! Your hard work, enthusiasm, love for and commitment to the game is its greatest strength, the value of which is incalculable.

Volleyball Queensland's financial investment into the National Volleyball Charter increases each year. The Charter is a cooperative partnership with all other state associations and Volleyball Australia to give rise to improvements in collective activities, such as education programs, integrity matters, an entry level product (formerly 'Spikezone'), a national facility strategy, and shared resources such as HR servicing.

With year two of the Australian Volleyball Super League held in 2024, consistent with its 'mantra' to develop a highly marketable, sponsorable for broadcast, indoor volleyball offering, comprising our best available players in franchised clubs as a product - the organisation invested into reducing the cost to the players and sought to present matches to a high standard leveraging the Queensland Pirates as a brand and encompassing the Junior Pirates Camps as a key component of the brand. Although the initiative is still in its early stages, the inclusion of our sponsorship partners such as Game, Scape, Mahindra, and Iona College, coupled with an emphasis on delivering high-quality spectator experiences, is highly encouraging.

GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT CONT.

Over 2024, the Board has initiated a number of reviews or studies of the organisation and/or the sport. These have included:

- A HR Compliance Audit & Report this was a 'look under the hood' of how the organisation goes about employment of staff, what practices are followed, and what documentation is in place. This led to the initiation of several new policies and agreements.
- A review of all Volleyball Queensland Policies across behaviour, operations, sport delivery, and 'external protocol adoption' such as concussion for their usefulness, currency, etc. The outcomes are expected in 2025.
- A study by The University of Queensland, in partnership with Volleyball Queensland, on the culture of the youth and junior representative programs, this is an ongoing project, commencing over summer with the Queensland Youth Beach Volleyball program cohort.
- Late in the year, an externally conducted organisational Review, across four focus areas - Policy & Documentation Review, Staff & Team Function Consultation, Leadership, Strategy & Vision, and External Engagement. The outcomes are expected in 2025.

In concluding my report and - while a little distant from Queensland - the Paris Olympics provided the most memorable beach volleyball court in the world! and, of course, the Games themselves were amazing, with our 'Volleyroos' competing fantastically well. Both beach and indoor events were wonderfully presented, with an incredible level of fan engagement.

I acknowledge the support of the Queensland Government to conduct various activities and programs of Volleyball Queensland, and each of the City of Gold Coast and Sunshine Coast Councils for their investment in Volleyball Queensland's events.

To my colleagues whether you are in the core 'head office' team or a member of the casual workforce, I thank you for your dedication and tireless work to deliver the formidable program of events and activities you did so well over 2024.

I particularly thank the affiliated clubs and associations through their committee members, it is a pleasure to work for and with you and congratulate the Board members on their effort and commitment to their task in governing the organisation.

Competitions Report

TOURNAMENTS & LEAGUES

Queensland Beach Volleyball Tour (QBVT)

The 2023/24 Pillow Talk QBVT consisted of 13 rounds, ranging from Cairns to Coolangatta. A new stop was added to the Tour this season in Tangalooma (Moreton Island) thanks to event promoter V'Ball in Paradise; at the season-ending awards the players voted this their favourite event of the season.

Participation rates remain high, with just over 1,000 individuals taking part over the 2023/24 season. Due to the increasing popularity of junior divisions, three events at Sandstorm were split into juniors' weekend and seniors' weekends. Over the season, eight of the 13 rounds saw 100+ teams compete, the largest being the Queensland Open (200 teams), which has found a home at Bulcock Beach/Happy Valley on the Sunshine Coast thanks to the backing of the Sunshine Coast Council and support from The Sandpit. For the record, the Open divisions were won by Caitlin Bettenay/Phoebe Bell (Caitlin's third Open title in a row!) in the Women's Open, and in the Men Shaun Andersen/Bradley Sting (Brad's second Open title in a row!).

The season-ending QBVT Championships were hosted by Sandstorm. As the culmination of the QBVT season, only the top eight teams in each division were eligible to compete and resulted in some intense battles. The Tour Champion trophies were decided under lights on Sandstorm's championship court. The women's final was won by the team of Majabelle Lawac/Linline Matauatu from Vanuatu (who based themselves in Queensland for most of the summer) and in the men's young guns Jerome Mak / Timothee Philippe overcame their experienced opponents to take the title. Both finals were live-streamed.

A massive thank you to Pillow Talk Australia and all the event sponsors, the event promoters, all the players, helpers and supporters.

TOURNAMENTS & LEAGUES CONT.

Premier Volleyball League (PVL)

In 2024, across 16 rounds of competition, 24 Affiliates with a combined total of 266 teams (152 PVL, 114 JPVL) competed in the largest season of the Premier Volleyball League and Junior Premier Volleyball League to date, spanning across multiple venues in Brisbane and Gold Coast.

Each Friday and Sunday, teams competed against each other in both the junior divisions (JPVL) and senior divisions (PVL) across the city and beyond. This year was especially exciting with the introduction of the first ever interstate team, Ballina Tridents.

The PVL/JPVL Grand Finals for all divisions were held at The Gap State High School where the PVL Operations Team converted the venue to host the showcase match. 2024 saw Gold Coast Volleyball Club face off against Aces United in the Premier Women Division, with Aces claiming a 3-2 win. In the Premier Men's Division, the highly anticipated rematch between BVC Bears and the previous year's Division Champions, QUT Cobras, saw QUT reclaim their premiership in a 4-set match. A massive congratulations to Brisbane Volleyball Club who claimed the PVL Club Championship in a nail-biting race at the end of the season.

It would be remiss not to thank our Venue Managers, Referee Supervisors/Coaches, First Aid Providers, Delivery Staff, and Competition Support Officers who worked tirelessly each week to deliver the competition on the frontline as well as in the background. Without their work and dedication, we would not have been able to deliver a competition on this scale.

Queensland Country Championships

Volleyball Queensland's 2024 Queensland Country Championships took place in Bundaberg. Thirty-five (35) teams, representing nine (9) clubs from as far away as Toowoomba and Gladstone, took part.

This tournament was hosted across three venues: at Bundaberg State High School, Bundaberg Christian College and Bundaberg PCYC. After two massive days of competition, Toowoomba Volleyball Association retained their crown of Queensland Country Champions.

VQ wishes to thank the workforce in the planning and delivery of this tournament - Chief Referee, Competition Manager, Referees, Sports Trainers, Tournament Administrator and Venue Managers, along with Coaches, Volunteers and Players.

Metro League

Volleyball Queensland's 2024 Metro League competition was held year-round on Tuesday evenings at Nissan Arena and attracted 39 teams across the three seasons.

Volleyball Queensland wishes to congratulate all medalists and MVP winners and thank the workforce in the planning and delivery of this tournament, Competition Manager, Referees, and Venue Managers, along with the players for their continued participation in Brisbane's premier social competitive indoor volleyball competition.

Beach Schools Cup

Beach Schools Cup continues to be a remarkable success story for the sport. Since 72 teams competed in the 2016 edition the event has continued to grow year-on-year. The 2024 edition featured a whopping 466 teams from 55 schools.

To accommodate this huge number of entries 54 courts were built on the sands of Coolangatta Beach. Teams competed in either 2-a-side or 4-a-side divisions and ranged from Year 7 to Year 12.

b) Senior Schools Cup

Played by Year 11 and 12 students on the Gold Coast 9-11 August, the 2024 edition again smashed all records:

Number of teams = 326 (previous highest 292 teams)

Number of schools = 157 (previous record 137)

c) Junior Schools Cup

Played on the Gold Coast (18-20 Oct), Junior Schools Cup is for teams of Year 7 & 8 players, with more schools than ever taking part.:

Number of teams = 255 teams

Number of schools = 94 (previous record 91)

d) Champion School Trophy Race

The Champion School Trophy is awarded to the best performing school over Junior, Intermediate and Senior Schools Cups. The top six points earning teams from a school, with a maximum of one team per gender-age group, will contribute to that school's Champion School points. Higher divisions are worth more points.

From the record 187 schools who played the 2024 Champion School were Kelvin Grove.

Across the three indoor schools cups one-third (33%) of all high schools in Queensland participated!

e) Primary Schools Cup

Played in term three, for many of the Year 4, Year 5 and Year 6 participants Primary Schools Cup is their first introduction to volleyball.

In 2024, with entry numbers over the past few years continuing to grow, VQ continued to expand Primary Schools Cup to a series of 'Qualifier' events culminating in a Finals. The benefits of this are two-fold:

- Increase capacity
- Break down the barrier of travel

Regional events were played at:

- Cleveland District SH - 35 teams from 6 schools took part
- Redeemer Lutheran College - 43 teams from 7 schools took part
- Ambrose Treacy College - 26 teams from 6 schools took part
- Hill International College - 20 teams from 4 schools took part
- Finals (Craigslea SHS) - 183 teams from 19 schools took part

Bellevue Park Primary (Gold Coast) won the 2024 Champion School Trophy. A big thanks to all the host schools, their teachers and students who helped build the courts, referee the matches, track the results, and generally inspire our next generation of volleyballers.

Queensland Junior State Championships

Volleyball Queensland's 2024 Junior State Championships played host to a variety of affiliated and non-affiliated clubs, associations, and schools from across the state and New South Wales. This tournament was hosted under one roof at the Gold Coast Sports and Leisure Centre, which saw a record 112 teams compete.

Congratulations to all teams who participated in this year's tournament with strong successes from West Brisbane Warriors, Easts Volleyball, Dragons Volleyball, Elite Volleyball and Gold Coast Volleyball claiming gold medals across multiple divisions.

Pathways Report



Queensland Pirates - Australian Volleyball Super League (AVSL)

With the first season of the new and exciting Australian Volleyball Super League relaunched in 2023 under our belts, the Queensland Pirates were hungry to improve the 6th-place and 2nd-place finishes for the Men and Women respectively. The Women headed into the season hungry for redemption after going down to the Perth Steel in the 2023 Grand Final. The Men had a less-than-ideal season in 2023, with their lowest-placed finish in decades.

Iona College once again renewed their partnership as one of the key sponsors of the Scape Queensland Pirates, providing their beautiful state-of-the-art sports precinct, the Provence Centre, for training and home games. Queensland was awarded three home games this season, and with the continuation of SBS on Demand as a streaming partner for one match per round, Queensland were the first cab off the rank for the 2024 season.

Our first home match on Father's Day against Melbourne Vipers secured the biggest crowd of the three home rounds, the Pirates Women fell short to the Vipers 2-3 with the Men just reversing the Women's result for a 3-2 victory. At the conclusion of the round matches, the Men and Women were both afforded a ticket to the finals with the Women scraping in as 4th and the Men sliding in 2nd-place.

The finals were held in Adelaide at the 36ers Arena, and the Men and Women managed to both win their semifinals to book a double gold medal match spot for Super Sunday. In history-breaking scenes, the Queensland Pirates Men and Women were both victorious in their Gold Medal Matches, leading to a dual national championship for the program.

Congratulations to Kylie Marshall and Terry Rudder for leading an astounding 2024 program for both the Men and the Women. There are so many people involved in this program including the assistant coaches, statisticians, and training partners and physiotherapists. The Scape Queensland Pirates wish to thank all volunteers, sponsors, and supporters involved in 2024. Congratulations to Jaek Passier, Michele Herbert, and Chris Kelly who were appointed to referee and score at the Super League Finals.

Australian Youth Beach Volleyball Championships (AYBVC)

Volleyball Queensland's Youth Beach State Teams participate annually in the Australian Youth Beach Volleyball Championships (AYBVC). This tournament attracts teams from all over Australia and is played across five different age groups: U14, U15, U16, U17 & U18. In 2024, all competing states, and the 195 strong QLD delegation, descended on the Gold Coast for a week of competitive volleyball.

The event was mostly sunny and pleasant, with a cheeky rain episode on finals day. Queensland has a great history at AYBVC and 2024 would prove to be no exception, with QLD claiming 5 Gold and 4 Silver Medals. The success on the Medal tally including the U18 Boys (Larsen/Sazdov) and U18 Girls (Conlon/Hansen) who both finished on top of the podium, a wonderful way to see out their youth beach program.

A huge thank you to all our volunteer coaches, parents, athletes, and referees for an exceptional week at Coolangatta Beach.

Australian Junior Volleyball Championships (AJVC)

The Australian Junior Volleyball Championships (AJVC) launched in 2022, continued in 2024 but moved its presence to Adelaide. Queensland entered 6 teams with U19 Women, two U19 Men, U23 Women and two U23 Men teams.

Queensland teams contested the tournament well with appearances in the gold medal match for the U19M Maroon and U19W Maroon in the premier division. In division 1, U19M White and U23 Men White both contested gold medals with the U19M claiming the gold in the Premier and Division 1.

A huge thank you to all our volunteer coaches, parents, athletes, and referees for an enjoyable week in Adelaide.

Australian Youth Volleyball Championships (AYVC)

The Australian Youth Volleyball Championships returned to Bendigo, Victoria for its final year in 2024. Volleyball Queensland nominated 20 teams, 43 coaches, 5 support staff, and 17 referees to attend AYVC, which is the biggest Queensland delegation that has competed at a national championship. Queensland headed into finals day with appearances in 8 out of the 10 gold medal matches on offer.

Queensland was named National Champions in the U15 Girls, U16 Boys, U17 Boys, U18 Girls and U18 Boys. Special mention must go to the U15 Girls Program for finishing their division with a gold and silver medal. The President's Cup was awarded to Queensland at the conclusion of the tournament with 25 points. Victoria was the runner up on 16 points, clearly demonstrating the dominance Queensland had on the competition. Queensland U15 Girls Head Coach Stephanie Acraman was voted Queensland Coach of the Year for the tournament and was presented with this award at the closing ceremony. Congratulations to all athletes, coaches, referees, and volunteers involved with AYVC.

Junior Pirates Camp

Volleyball Queensland's Junior Pirates camp hosted two events across the year, with a Summer, and Winter camp delivered in 2024. The Summer camp enjoyed the 5-court venue at Kelvin Grove State College's Brooker Stadium, whilst the Winter camp was held at The Gap State High School. Both camps reached capacity, and a few returning and new coaches were in attendance.

EDUCATION REPORT

In 2024, Volleyball Queensland reaffirmed its commitment to building capacity and broadening access to the sport through a strong focus on education, accreditation, and participation. As interest in the sport continues to surge across the state, the need for skilled coaches, referees, and program facilitators has never been greater. Through partnerships with Volleyball Australia and national initiatives like Sporting Schools, Volleyball Queensland has responded with programs that not only met this demand but also laid the foundation for future growth.

Accreditation Membership Growth and Demographics

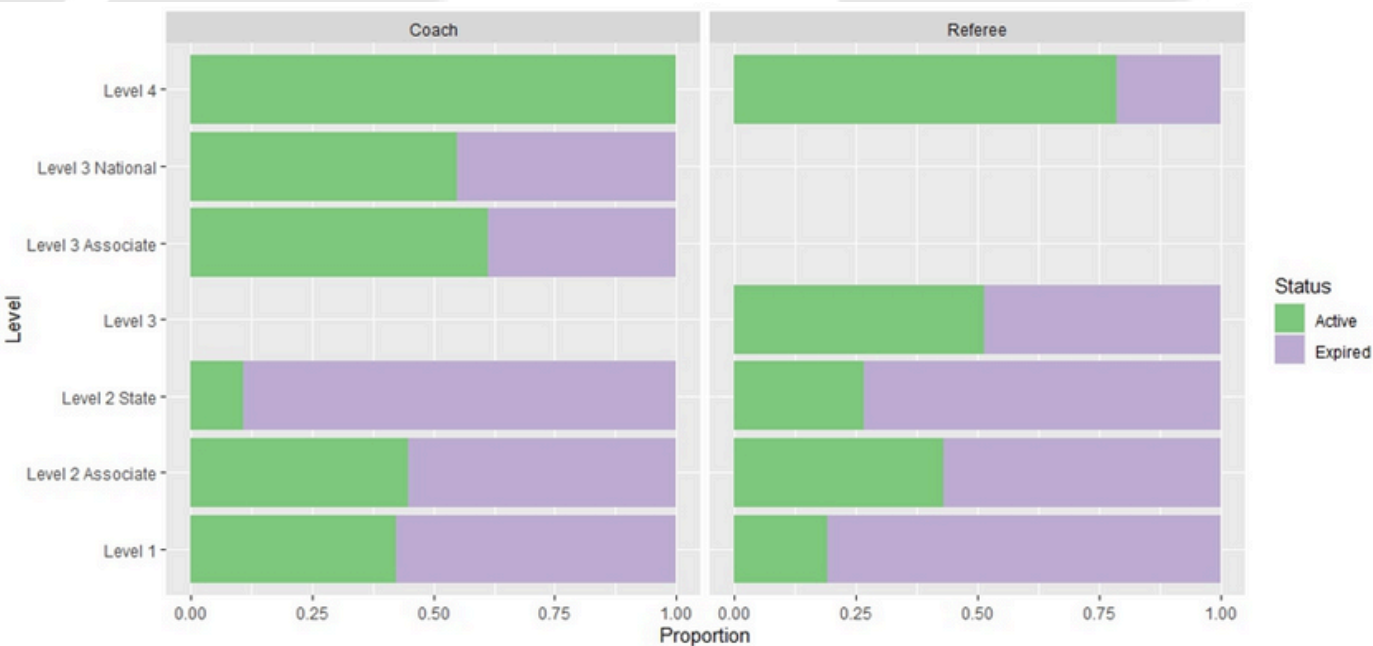
Volleyball Queensland’s total accredited membership reached 7,154 in 2024, marking a 7.1% increase from the previous year and a 36.2% growth over the past four years. While growth has moderated since its peak in 2021–2022, the upward trend reflects sustained engagement, particularly among younger demographics. More than half of all members (51%) are aged 24 or under, including 33% aged 18–24 and 18% under 18. This youthful base has been bolstered by the requirement for State team athletes to complete Level 1 referee accreditation—demonstrating a strong alignment between development pathways and participation incentives.

Accreditation and Workforce Development

In 2024, Volleyball Queensland (VQ) strengthened its education and workforce strategy to meet growing participation demands. With over 7,000 accredited members, the challenge now lies in retention—particularly for entry- and mid-level referees and coaches whose accreditations have expired at an alarming rate.

VQ recorded 1,754 active referee accreditations in 2024. However, this sits against a concerning backdrop of 5,551 expired accreditations, primarily concentrated at Level 1. This group—the largest among both active and expired officials—reflects the high turnover associated with foundational accreditation required for school participation. Similarly, Level 2 State referees face poor retention—likely tied to short-term involvement in national junior competitions.

Encouragingly, retention is strongest at the elite level. Level 4 referees maintain the highest accreditation continuity, likely due to sustained competition involvement and mentorship roles. Patterns also suggest overlap between roles—e.g., Level 2 Associate Referees show similar retention trends to their coaching peers—indicating shared development pathways that may benefit from joint engagement strategies.

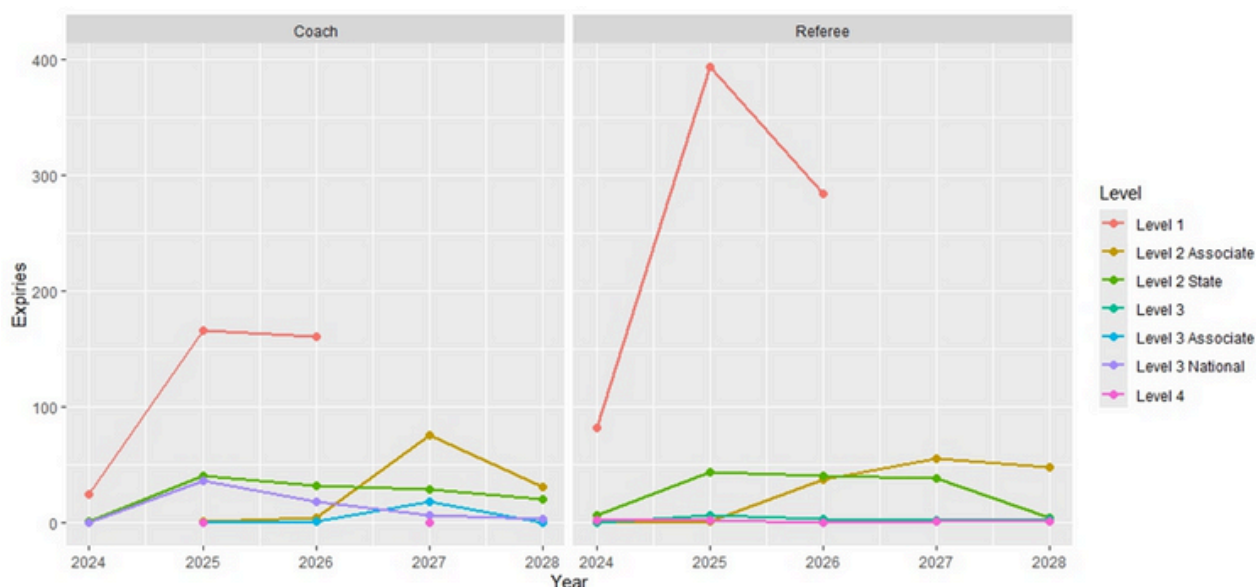

Of the 683 active coaches recorded, most hold Level 1 or Level 2 Associate credentials. However, 1,729 coaching accreditations have lapsed, with the weakest retention at the Level 2 State Coach tier. This is concerning given their vital role in athlete development and competition delivery.

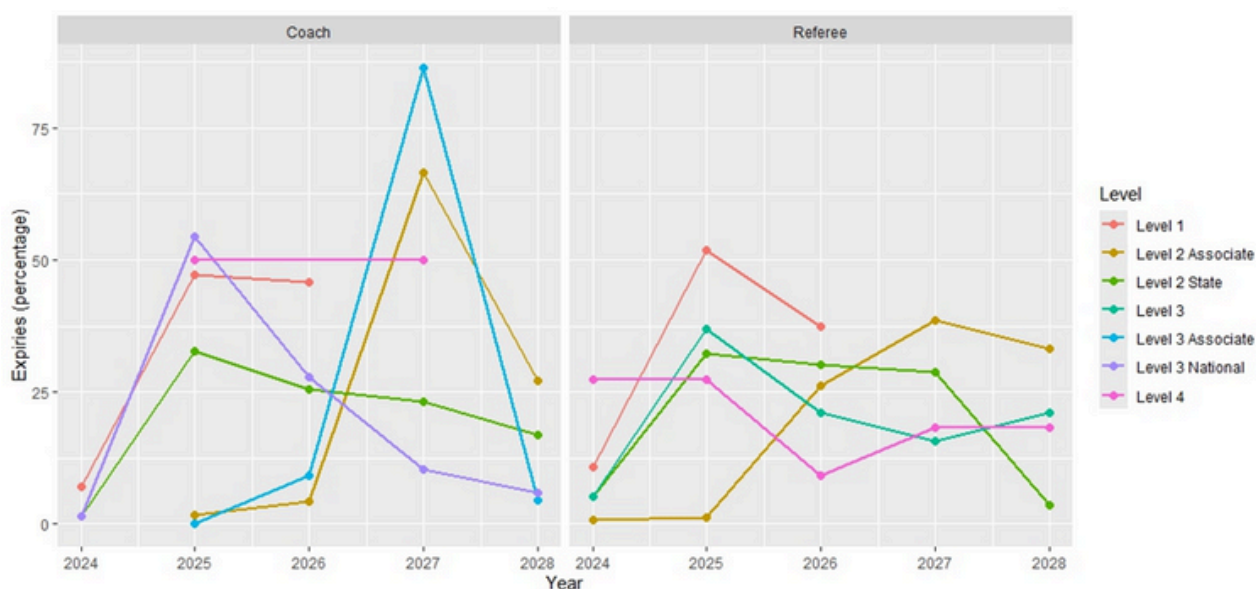
In contrast, retention at the top end is strong. Level 4 coaches display excellent continuity, reinforcing the long-term commitment often seen among high-performance coaches. Participation in online development remained robust, with 235 course completions via revSPORT and legacy platform - LearnDASH, further highlighting the appetite for accessible learning.

Trends in Expiry and Retention Risk

The three visual analyses offer deeper insight. The above—a stacked bar chart—highlights Level 1 referees and coaches as the largest and most at-risk cohort for expiry. High-volume entry at this level must now be met with equal effort in re-engagement and retention.



Projected expiries (2024–2028) reveal major peaks in 2025, especially among Level 1 referees and coaches and Level 2 State officials. Level 2 Associate Referees and Coaches also present a looming concern, with expiry numbers expected to build through 2026–2027. While Level 4 accreditations remain stable, the mid-tier workforce is under strain—particularly those facilitating regional or development-level play.



Communications Report



In 2024, we continued to build on the momentum established in 2023, further enhancing our digital presence and deepening our connection with the Volleyball Queensland community. We strategically leveraged social media platforms, targeted communications, and engaging content to promote our events and strengthen relationships across our network. As we head into 2025, we are committed to refining our approach through data-driven insights and expanding our reach across emerging digital spaces.

Our social media platforms have continued to show positive growth, with Instagram maintaining its status as our top performer. In 2024, we saw an additional 22% increase in followers, further reinforcing the effectiveness of our dynamic content strategy. Reels, Stories, and interactive posts remain central to our engagement efforts, while we've refined our messaging to better reflect the diverse voices and interests of our community. A notable addition this year has been Instagram's Collaboration feature, which has significantly boosted our engagement. By co-authoring posts with partners, athletes, and sponsors, we've been able to tap into new audiences, increase our visibility, and create more authentic connections with followers, further driving interaction and community growth.

On Facebook, our community engagement has grown by 6%, indicating a continued strong connection with our audience. The interaction with our content has deepened, with more sharing, comments, and active discussions, highlighting the ongoing relevance of our platform. Our monthly newsletters have been an invaluable tool for engaging with our members. This year, our average open rate was 41.1%, well above the industry average. This growth reflects our commitment to delivering content that is both informative and engaging, reinforcing our position as a trusted source of information within the volleyball community. Additionally, we've seen a noticeable rise in click-through rates, further underscoring the increasing value our audience places on the content we provide.

While we had planned to expand into TikTok and LinkedIn in 2024, this goal was not fully realized. However, we remain excited about the potential these platforms hold for the future. In 2025, we are committed to focusing on both TikTok and LinkedIn to extend our reach to new and diverse audiences. TikTok will offer us the opportunity to engage younger, more interactive viewers through creative and casual video content, while LinkedIn will help strengthen our connections with industry professionals, partners, and sponsors.

The cornerstone of our digital content remains high-quality photography, which continues to capture the excitement and energy of our events. This year, we also introduced a more video-centric approach, particularly for Instagram content. Raw, unfiltered clips combined with carefully curated video stories have allowed us to showcase the authenticity of our community while aligning with the trends of digital content consumption.

Looking ahead to 2025, we are excited to grow our presence on TikTok and LinkedIn. We plan to introduce fresh, engaging content strategies tailored to these platforms, such as live-streamed events, influencer partnerships, and targeted professional networking initiatives. These new strategies will enhance our visibility, drive engagement, and provide more opportunities to connect with the volleyball community and beyond.

The year ahead holds great potential. With our dedicated team and a focused approach, we are poised to innovate further, expand our digital reach, and inspire even greater community engagement in the sport of volleyball.

As we move into 2025, we are excited to continue building on the strong foundations laid in 2024. Our commitment to innovation, community engagement, and high-quality content will remain central to our strategy. By refining our approach, expanding our digital presence, and embracing new platforms, we are confident that we will reach even greater heights in connecting with our audience and promoting the sport of volleyball. We look forward to another year of growth, collaboration, and success, and to furthering our mission to engage and inspire the Volleyball Queensland community.

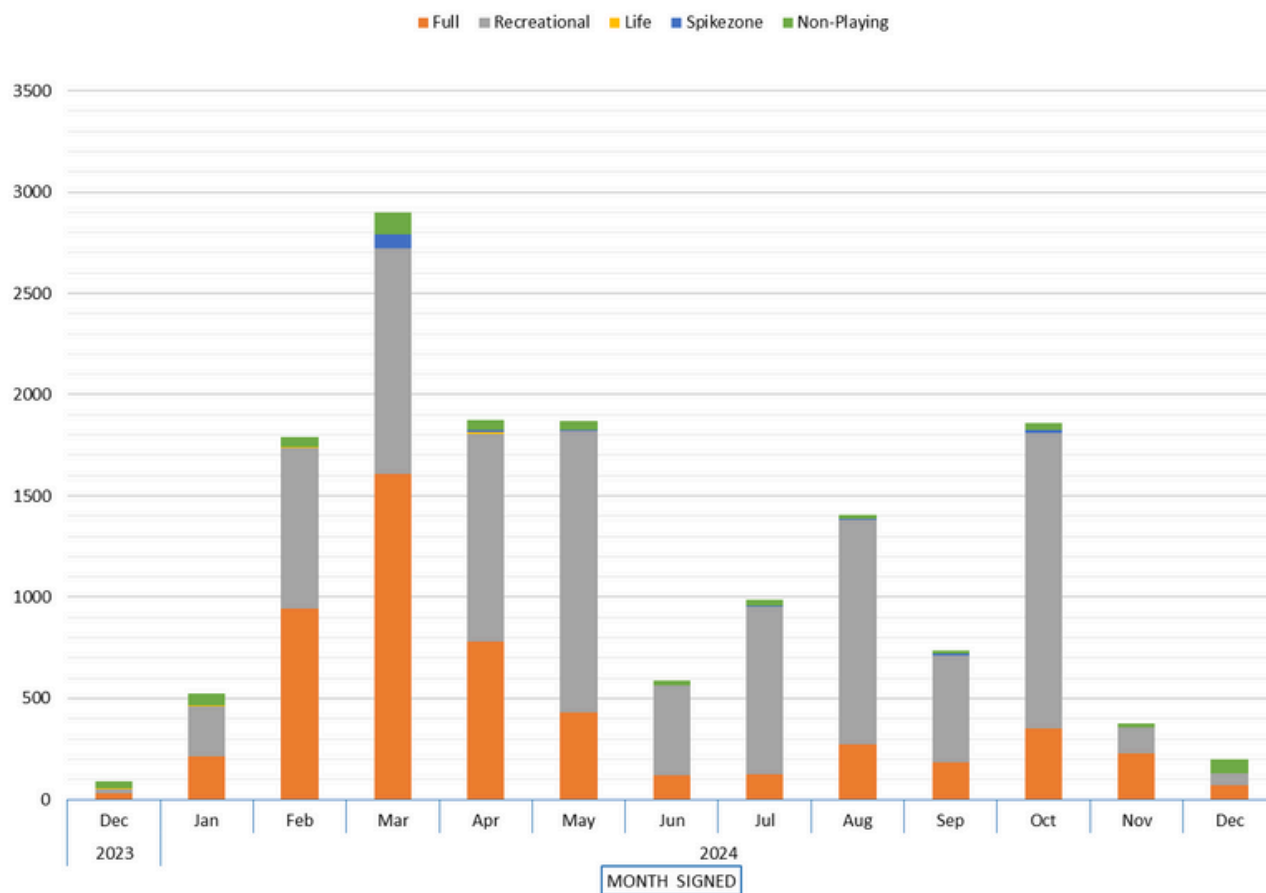

- Annual season structure has more or less become set over 2 weeknights, Social Division 1 & 2, Div 1 & 2 à Championship/Challenger, and social mixed 6's creating a variety and diversity for all over 12 months.
- VA / VQ/ SMA Heat Policy incorporated into adjusted playing schedule.
- Level 2 referee & Level 2 coaching opportunities held in Cairns (40 participants).
- Cairns QBVT had higher numbers yet again, increased competitors from SEQ and Sydney/ Melbourne making the most of the Cairns Festival in great weather @26°C.
- **Junior members:** 18G finished 6th, and 18B 8th at Australian Youth Beach Volleyball Championships an additional 3 competing for Queensland at AYVC.

Cairns Volleyball has continued in a positive direction whereby the committee is managing/ developing more activities and is administering less of these activities, but the club/life balance still has much improvement for future success.

As a club committed to pushing boundaries, 2024 has been a year of continued growth and innovation, driven by strategic initiatives that have strengthened our presence and redefined what is possible in the volleyball space. Our commitment to excellence and forward-thinking approach has maximised our efforts to deliver an improved player experience and deepened community engagement.

At Creadaptive Volleyball Club (CVC), fostering talent and driving player development has always been at the heart of our mission. We made significant strides by leveraging and embracing technology, such as online AI training platforms, forming strategic partnerships to provide more benefits for our players, and continued building on our current programs and frameworks to ensure they remain aligned with the evolving needs of our players.

To drive our mission forward, we established five (5) key initiatives that go further to support the development of our players, while reinforcing our commitment to driving positive change and giving back to the broader community.

- **CVC Assist** – A support system for players experiencing financial difficulty. Through this program, players can request tailored payment arrangements, extensions on any outstanding amounts, a waiver of late fees, or full subsidies in exceptional circumstances.
- **CVC Outreach** – A program that acknowledges, recognises and embraces our responsibility of driving positive change. Each month, we donate to five different charities in the following categories: Women Support, Environmental Protection, Humanitarian Aid, Men Support and Diversity, Equity and Inclusion.
- **CVCAid** – A pillar of support for Team CVC. Under this program, volunteers and staff members facing personal hardship or misfortune can receive immediate financial assistance for situations such as injury or illness, medical emergencies, funeral costs for family members, fire or natural disasters, financial hardship, and more. Coaches can also have any of their coaching or refereeing accreditations fully reimbursed through this program.

In 2023, we began with a modest group of 10 players, and in 2024 we've grown to over 50. This remarkable increase is a testament to the value we provide and the positive impact we have on our players' lives. A large part of this growth can be attributed to the unique benefits we offer to our players which go beyond the court. Through extensive fundraising efforts, we have also been able to cover tournament costs for our players. Notes to the Financial Statements

For the Year Ended 31 December 2024

The financial statements cover Queensland Volleyball Association Inc. as an individual entity. Queensland Volleyball Association Inc. is a not-for-profit Association incorporated in Queensland under the ***Associations Incorporation Act (QLD) 1981 (as amended by the Associations Incorporation and Other Legislation Amendment Act (QLD) 2020)*** ('the Act').

1 Basis of Preparation

In the opinion of the Committee of Management, the Association is not a reporting entity since there are unlikely to exist users of the financial statements who are not able to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy specifically all of their information needs. These special purpose financial statements have been prepared to meet the reporting requirements of the Act.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non current financial assets and financial liabilities.

Significant accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and are consistent with prior reporting periods unless otherwise stated.

2 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Going concern

The Board of Management have prepared the financial statements on a going concern basis, which contemplates the continuity of normal business activities and the realisation of assets and the settlement of liabilities in the ordinary course of business.

(b) Revenue and other income

Specific revenue streams

Grant revenue

Grant revenue is recognised in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income when the entity obtains control of the grant, it is probable that the economic benefits gained from the grant will flow to the entity and the amount of the grant can be measured reliably. When there are conditions attached to grant revenue relating to the use of those grants for a specific purposes it is recognised in the balance sheet as a liability until such conditions are met or services provided. Where the grant is for a specific period of time, it is recognised over that period of time.

Membership fees and competition fees

Membership and competition fees revenue is recognised when money is received.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

(c) Income Tax

The Association is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the ***Income Tax Assessment Act 1997***. The association has availed the benefit of the tax exemptions available under the rules provided in Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment.

For the Year Ended 31 December 2024

2 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

(d) Employee benefits

Provision is made for the Association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to be wholly settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled. Long service leave is recognised after 7 years of service.

(e) Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost of inventory is determined using the first-in-first-out basis.

(f) Property, plant and equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment.

Items of property, plant and equipment acquired for significantly less than fair value have been recorded at the acquisition date fair value.

Depreciation

Property, plant and equipment, excluding freehold land, is depreciated on a straight-line basis over the asset's useful life to the Association, commencing when the asset is ready for use.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable asset are shown below:

(g) Financial instruments

Financial instruments are recognised initially on the date that the Association becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

On initial recognition, all financial instruments are measured at fair value plus transaction costs (except for instruments measured at fair value through profit or loss where transaction costs are expensed as incurred).

Financial assets

All recognised financial assets are subsequently measured in their entirety at either amortised cost or fair value, depending on the classification of the financial assets.

Classification

On initial recognition, the Association classifies its financial assets into the following categories, those

Amortised cost

The Association's financial assets measured at amortised cost comprise trade and other receivables and cash and cash equivalents in the statement of financial position.

Financial assets through profit or loss

All financial assets not classified as measured at amortised cost or fair value through other comprehensive income as described above are measured at FVTPL.

Net gains or losses, including any interest or dividend income are recognised in profit or loss.

Trade receivables

Impairment of trade receivables have been determined using the simplified approach in AASB 9 which uses an estimation of lifetime expected credit losses.

The amount of the impairment is recorded in a separate allowance account with the loss being recognised in finance expense. Once the receivable is determined to be uncollectable then the gross carrying amount is written off against the associated allowance.

Where the Association renegotiates the terms of trade receivables due from certain customers, the new expected cash flows are discounted at the original effective interest rate and any resulting difference to the carrying value is recognised in profit or loss.

Financial liabilities

The financial liabilities of the Association comprise trade payables and other liabilities.

(h) Impairment of non-financial assets

At the end of each reporting period the Association determines whether there is evidence of an impairment indicator for non-financial assets.

Where an indicator exists and regardless for indefinite life intangible assets and intangible assets not yet available for use, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated.

2 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

(i) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

(j) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenue, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

Cash flows in the statement of cash flows are included on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which is recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is classified as operating cash flows.

3 Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgments

The directors make estimates and judgements during the preparation of these financial statements regarding assumptions about current and future events affecting transactions and balances.

These estimates and judgements are based on the best information available at the time of preparing the financial statements, however as additional information is known then the actual results may differ from the estimates.

The significant estimates and judgements made have been described below.

Key estimates - fair value of financial instruments

The Association has certain financial assets which are measured at fair value. Where fair value has not able to be determined based on quoted price, a valuation model has been used. The inputs to these models are observable, where possible, however these techniques involve significant estimates and therefore fair value of the instruments could be affected by changes in these assumptions and inputs. In the current year, management was able to determine the quoted price from the market.

Key estimates - provisions

The Association is party to an arrangement with Volleyball Australia for the "We are Volleyball" program. This program has occurred in previous years and the Board of Management expects that the program is likely to exist going forward. The program includes costs for consultants, equipment and insurance. The Board of Management has estimated a provision of \$170,000 which is to be used towards this program. The provision is based on the 2021 budgeted number of members of approximately 7,000 at \$10 each and 2022 budgeted number of members of approximately 10,000 at \$10 each. The assessment of this provision required a degree of estimation and judgement. The Board of Management has estimated this provision based on historical information relating to this program and other related programs. As at 31 December 2024, provision has been slightly adjusted to reflect the existing members.

- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Association's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by the management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of the management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Association's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Association to cease to continue as a going concern.

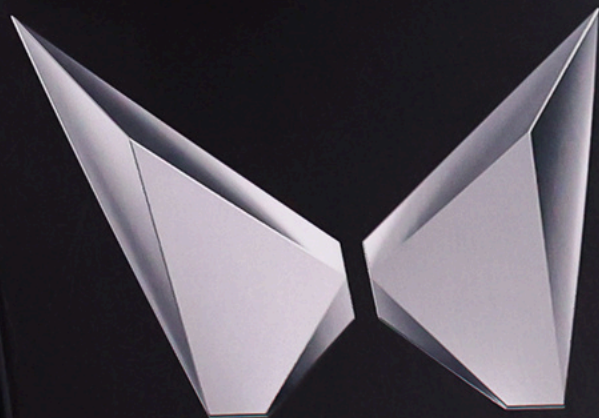
