The organisation was formed in 1969 and is supported by a network of affiliated clubs and associations stretching from Cairns to the Gold Coast.

Volleyball Queensland provides volleyball opportunities for players - Youth and Senior, experienced and novice - through its competitive, recreational, and school-based tournaments, leagues, and events. In addition, Volleyball Queensland offers a range of membership activities, including memberships and competitions, across beach, indoor, and sitting volleyball disciplines.

Volleyball Queensland engages with its fellow state and territory volleyball associations under the auspices of Volleyball Australia to further the sport nationally and to compete in Australian Championships for beach, indoor sitting volleyball.

Volleyball Queensland is guided by its elected Board of Management, generating financial resources through a range of activities including competitions, leagues, feature events and corporate partnerships. The organisation is generously supported with grant funding by the Queensland Government.

President's Report

2025 was a year that asked a great deal of Volleyball Queensland – and the organisation, its community, and its people rose to meet every challenge. On the court, Queensland's athletes continued to deliver performances of the highest order.

The President's Shield came home for the 11th consecutive year following another dominant display at the Australian Youth Beach Volleyball Championships at Coolangatta, where Queensland's U17 Boys teams produced a remarkable clean sweep of the podium – finishing 1st, 2nd, and 3rd. At the Australian Youth Volleyball Championships in Perth, Queensland travelled as the largest touring group in the competition – 200 athletes across 20 teams – and delivered a stunning finals day, claiming gold medals in all five boys' divisions and the U16 Girls division. It was Queensland's 13th consecutive President's Cup. At the Australian Junior Volleyball Championships in Adelaide, we claimed Gold in the U19 Men's division and three silver medals.

The Queensland Pirates Men's program delivered a flawless AVSL season – undefeated – reclaiming the national title in a dominant campaign. We are equally proud of the Queensland Pirates Women's program, who were heartbreakingly close to another finals appearance. And for the first time, both Pirates

programs competed on the international stage at the Asian Champions League, a proud milestone for Queensland volleyball. Membership continued to grow, with 15,959 Queenslanders registered across our 34 affiliate clubs and associations in 2025 – another strong result that reflects the enduring appeal of volleyball in all its forms across our state.

Off the court, the Board confronted one of its most significant responsibilities: Stewarding the organisation through a leadership transition following the departure of long-serving General Manager Gary O'Donnell, while ensuring VQ's operations continued without interruption. I want to acknowledge the professionalism of the VQ staff who maintained that continuity during a demanding period.

The Board's search for a new Chief Executive Officer was conducted with care and deliberate rigour. In Gill O'Mara, who joined VQ in September 2025, we found the right person – someone who brings genuine community orientation, strategic clarity, and the experience to lead this organisation towards its considerable ambitions. The Board has been deeply encouraged by the energy and leadership Gill has brought to the organisation, and we are confident in what lies ahead for our community.

In 2025, we also acknowledged the resignation of Vicky Andrews from the Board after many years of dedicated service. We are fortunate that Vicky continues to serve the sport as Chair of the Beach Volleyball Sub-Committee. Late in the year, we welcomed Madeleine Warner to the Board and look forward to her contribution, bringing valuable expertise in communications and marketing.

I thank my fellow Board members for their commitment and my colleagues on VQ's various sub-committees for their expertise and dedication. I gratefully acknowledge the Queensland Government for its continued investment in our sport, along with the support of Volleyball Australia and our valued partners and sponsors: City of Gold Coast, Fine Designs, GAME, Iona College, Mahindra, Maranoa Regional Council, Pillow Talk, Mikasa, Rogue Gun, Scape Student Living, Statewide Sports, Sunshine Coast Council, Team Pay, and The Sandpit.

I also extend sincere thanks to our Queensland Beach Volleyball Tour promoters: Brisbane Volleyball Club, Sandstorm Beach Volleyball, Cairns Volleyball Club, Fraser Coast Volleyball Collective, Rockhampton Sports Arena, and Vball in Paradise.

Most of all, I thank our affiliate clubs, coaches, officials, and volunteers who make Queensland volleyball what it is.

Treasurer's Report

Overview

VQ recorded a net deficit of \$204,072 for the year ended 31 December 2025. This result reflects a year of deliberate investment in our people and capability and includes significant one-off extraordinary costs arising from organisational transition. Members' equity remains strong at \$1,545,879.

Importantly, income grew strongly. Total revenue increased by \$500,509 (14%) to \$4,114,416, driven by record growth in participant contributions and membership fees. We also recorded \$66,000 of investment income. The deficit arose because expenditure increased by \$1,070,395 (33%).

What Drove the 2025 Result?

Extraordinary and One-Off Costs

The most significant driver of the 2025 deficit was a set of extraordinary, non-recurring costs associated with organisational change. These are captured in the Employee Benefits Expense and Consultancy & Contractor Fees lines, which together increased \$522,401 from the prior financial year.

At the start of 2025, the VQ Board initiated a strategic review into the organisation's capability to deal with growing demand and the Board's vision. Arising from the review, the Board embarked on a restructuring plan which incurred one-off costs such as human resource consulting, interim CEO fees, legal costs, employee remediation expenses, and recruitment costs.

These one-off items total approximately \$394,000. Excluding these costs, VQ's underlying business result for 2025 was a surplus of approximately \$189,000.

Members can be assured that these matters have been resolved, the organisation has been restructured appropriately, and the cost base going forward reflects normal operations.

Investing in Our People

Employee costs increased by \$275,294 (27%) to \$1,282,790. This reflects a deliberate decision to properly resource the organisation.

As noted in last year's Treasurer's Report, the Board had been focused on VQ's ability to sustain services through a robust, well-resourced workforce. That investment has now been made.

It is also important to acknowledge that the surpluses of prior years were in part a product of running the organisation with a leaner staffing model than was sustainable. The 2025 cost base more accurately reflects what it costs to run a state sporting organisation of VQ's scale and ambition.

Foundations for Sustainability

VQ has invested in reviews of the organisation's operations, competitions, events and activities. A hybrid approach was taken, combining internal personnel, valued volunteers and external consulting firms to ensure the review was robust, thorough and transparent. It is important to the Board that VQ identifies the events and services our members value, and new projects we need to direct our resources into.

Tournament and Competition Costs (Including AVSL)

Tournament and competition-related costs increased by \$482,334 (27%) to \$2,254,297, reflecting the growth in VQ's competition calendar and the full cost of our participation in the Australian Volleyball Super League (AVSL) through the Queensland Pirates.

VQ's involvement in the AVSL is a deliberate investment. We regard access to elite national competition as a responsibility to our highest-performing players and to the development of the sport in Queensland. The cost of this commitment is significant, and members are entitled to understand its full extent.

The costs to participate in and host AVSL amount to \$118,924 which is funded partially by player contributions. VQ's investment in AVSL is \$81,545. VQ continues to review input costs – including venue hire, labour, and event delivery

– and is committed to an ongoing review of pricing to ensure we maintain sustainable margins. Our approach is to deliver quality and value for members, not to chase a lower cost at the expense of the experience.

Future Focus

With the one-off extraordinary costs of 2025 now behind us, and the right team and structure in place, VQ is well-positioned to return to surplus. I would like to thank the VQ Board for its leadership in reviewing our strategic direction and structure. Thank you to the salaried team who have served our members and travelled with us through these major organisational changes and welcome to Gill in the CEO role which she has embraced enthusiastically.

Volleyball Queensland is financially secure and ready to seize the extraordinary opportunity that the Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games represents for volleyball in Queensland.

Chief Executive Officer's Report

I am deeply grateful to the VQ team – a group of talented, committed professionals who carried the organisation through a period of significant transition with remarkable composure and dedication. Joining alongside them has been one of the genuine highlights of my professional life.

To the Board: The contribution you made in 2025 was immense. Navigating a period of executive transition while maintaining strategic direction and operational stability is no small feat, and you did so with sound judgement, genuine commitment, and real care for the organisation and its community. Thank you for the opportunity to lead VQ, for the confidence you have placed in me from day one, and for your continued investment in our collective success.

An Extraordinary Year On The Court

As Boris has captured so well in his President's Report, 2025 was a year of exceptional on-court achievement across the breadth of Queensland volleyball. From the continued dominance of

our youth and beach programs, to the historic milestone of both the Women's and Men's Pirates squads competing internationally at the Asian Champions League, these performances are all a testament to the quality of our athletes, coaches, and pathway programs. Records fell at our domestic championships too, and our membership continued to grow. I am proud to have been part of this community for a small portion of that journey in 2025, and I look forward to contributing further to what we build together from here.

Building From The Inside

Alongside the competition calendar, much of 2025 was spent on work that does not make headlines but underpins our capability and sustainability. We undertook an organisational restructure to ensure VQ is resourced with the right people in the right roles, with clear responsibilities and genuine capability across all functions. We invested in strengthening our policy and procedure framework, ensuring our people are properly supported and our obligations clearly met. This work is far from glamorous but it is fundamental in future-proofing our organisation, and it will continue into 2026 as we extend our focus to include a broader review of governance structures and ways of working.

Towards the end of 2025, we also initiated a comprehensive Competition Review, examining how our competitions are structured, where participation is growing, where pathways need strengthening, and where the greatest opportunities lie. We expect to identify key findings by April 2026, which will directly inform how we evolve our competition offering over the years in a sustainable way, ensuring it serves our community rather than constrains it.

Looking Ahead

In the final months of 2025, I had the privilege of speaking with clubs, coaches, officials, parents, and participants across Queensland as part of the groundwork for VQ's 2026–2029 Strategic Plan. Those conversations revealed a community with a clear sense of what it needs: Stronger connections between clubs, schools, and the people who make this sport run; better access to the facilities and spaces where volleyball can grow; a more sustainable and resilient organisation capable of backing its ambitions; and volleyball experiences that are genuinely inclusive, inspiring, and accessible to every Queenslander.

These themes reflect the ambitions of a community that cares deeply about volleyball and about Queensland, and it gives us a clear and energising agenda. The 2026–2029 Strategic Plan, to be presented to our community in 2026, will articulate how we intend to address these and other emerging priorities with purpose and accountability – and Brisbane 2032 will remain a consistent and motivating horizon throughout.

We enter 2026 having navigated real change – and having come through it stronger, more capable, and more connected. There is much still to do, and I would not have it any other way. To every member of this community: Thank you for your passion, your patience, and your investment in this sport. It is an honour to serve alongside you, and I could not be more inspired by the future we will build together.

Queensland Junior State Championships

Volleyball Queensland's 2025 Junior State Championships played host to a variety of affiliated and non-affiliated clubs, associations, and schools from across the state and New South Wales.

This tournament was hosted at under one roof at the Gold Coast Sports and Leisure Centre and Coomera Indoor Sports Centre, which matched the record numbers set the previous year with 112 teams.

Congratulations to all teams who participated in this year's tournament with strong successes from West Brisbane Warriors, Elite Volleyball, South Brisbane Wolves, Dragons Volleyball, and Brisbane Volleyball Club claiming gold medals across multiple divisions.

Volleyball Queensland acknowledges and thanks the many individuals who contributed to the successful planning and delivery of this tournament. This includes the Chief Referee, Competition Manager, referees, sports trainers, tournament administrator and venue managers, whose collective efforts ensured the smooth operation of the event. We also recognise the valuable support of coaches and volunteers, and most importantly, the players who participated and helped make this a record-breaking tournament.

Queensland Senior State Championships

Volleyball Queensland's 2025 Senior State Championships hosted a record 140 affiliated and non-affiliated clubs, associations, and teams (up from 138 teams in 2024 – a 1.45% increase) over 9 Divisions from across the state and Victoria.

This tournament took place at Coomera Indoor Sports Centre, AB Paterson College Indoor Stadium and Runaway Bay Indoor Stadium over three unforgettable days on the October long weekend. Teams travelled as far as Cairns, Townsville, Fraser Coast, Gympie, Toowoomba, Townsville, and Sunshine Coast.

Volleyball Queensland wishes to thank everyone involved in the planning and delivery of this record-breaking tournament, including the Chief Referee, Competition Manager, Referees,

Sports Trainers, Tournament Administrator, Venue Managers, Coaches, Volunteers, and most importantly, the players who made the event possible.

Queensland Country Championships

Volleyball Queensland's 2025 Queensland Country Championships took place on the Sunshine Coast. A record fifty-two (52) teams took part, representing nine (9) clubs from as far away as Toowoomba, took part.

This tournament was hosted across 3 venues: Meridan State College, Caloundra Stadium and UniSC. After two massive days of competition Toowoomba Volleyball Association retained their crown of Queensland Country Champions.

Premier Volleyball League

In 2025, across 16 rounds of competition, 24 affiliates with a combined total of 279 teams (163 PVL, 116 JPVL), drawn from 25 clubs and associations, competed in the largest season of the Premier Volleyball League to date. Each Friday and Sunday, teams competed in both the junior (JPVL) and senior (PVL) divisions across the city and beyond. This year was particularly exciting, with growing interest in hosting Saturday night feature matches, as four different clubs took the opportunity to showcase their top teams.

The PVL/JPVL Grand Finals for all divisions were held at Boondall Sports Centre, where the PVL Operations Team transformed the venue and installed grandstands for spectators to enjoy the showcase matches.

The Premier divisions featured a “Battle of the Beasts”: SB Wolves v BVC Bears. In the end, honours were shared, with Wolves claiming the women’s title and Bears the men’s. However, across all divisions, Brisbane Volleyball Club (BVC) secured the PVL Club Championship in a nail-biting race at the end of the season.

Thank you to all clubs and associations, venue managers, referee supervisors and coaches, first aid providers, delivery staff, and competition support officers who worked tirelessly each week to deliver the competition, both on the

frontline and behind the scenes. Without their dedication, delivering a competition of this scale would not have been possible.

Thank you to everyone involved in the 2025 PVL season. We look forward to what the next season will bring.

Beach Schools Cup

What an adventure Beach Schools Cup was in 2025. The week before the event SEQ was subject to a cyclone, forcing postponement of the event. To cater for yr12 exams, the yr12 divisions were played on their own weekend in June, with all other age groups played in late July.

Despite this, Beach Schools Cup continues to be a remarkable success story for the sport. Since 72 teams competed in the 2016 edition the event has continued to grow year-on-year. The 2025 edition, featured a whopping 403 teams from 64 schools.

Special thanks to Pillow Talk for their support of Queensland Beach Volleyball, and to Major Events Gold Coast for their continued support of the event.

Thanks also to the army of helpers it takes to build all the courts and run the event.

Indoor Volleyball Schools Cups

Special thanks to the ongoing support of Major Events Gold Coast.

a) Intermediate Schools Cup

Designed for Year 9 and 10 students and played in Term 2 (30 May – 1 June) on the Gold Coast, the 2024 edition featured 298 teams from 126 schools, both records.

b) Senior Schools Cup

Played on the Gold Coast from 8–10 August, the 2025 edition again smashed all records:

Number of teams: 342 (previous highest: 326)

Number of schools: 165 (previous record: 157)

c) Junior Schools Cup

Played on the Gold Coast (24–26 October), the Junior Schools Cup is for teams of Year 7 and 8 players, with more schools than ever taking part.

Number of teams: 282

Number of schools: 104 (previous record: 94)

d) Champion School Trophy Race

The Champion School Trophy is awarded to the best-performing school across the Junior, Intermediate and Senior Schools Cups. The top six point-earning teams from each school, with a maximum of one team per gender-age group, contribute to that school's Champion School points. Higher divisions are weighted more heavily.

From a record 190 schools that participated in 2025, the Champion School was Craigslea SHS, by a narrow margin of three points over Kelvin Grove. Across the three indoor Schools Cups, one-third (33%) of all high schools in Queensland participated.

e) Primary Schools Cup

Played in Term 3, the Primary Schools Cup is often the first introduction to volleyball for many Year 4, 5 and 6 participants. In 2025, with entry numbers continuing to grow, VQ expanded the Primary Schools Cup into a series of 'Qualifier' events culminating in a finals event.

Regional events were played at:

- Cleveland District State College
- Redeemer Lutheran College
- Ambrose Treacy College
- Hillcrest Christian College
- Finals (Craigslea SHS)

Across all events, 291 teams from 42 schools took part. Bellevue Park State School (Gold Coast) won the 2025 Champion School Trophy.

A big thank you to all the host schools, their teachers and students who helped build the courts, referee matches, track results, and inspire the next generation of volleyballers.

Pathways Report

Australian Youth Beach Volleyball Championships (AYBVC)

Queensland once again demonstrated its dominance in beach volleyball, winning the Australian Youth Beach Volleyball Championships held at Coolangatta Beach in March. This marked the 11th consecutive year that Queensland has claimed the President's Shield.

A standout achievement came in the U17 Boys division, where Queensland athletes secured a clean sweep of the podium, finishing 1st, 2nd and 3rd. In the U16 Girls division, Jorja Grocott and Taylah Tulloch-Juleff delivered an impressive performance to secure the gold medal in a hard-fought final.

Across the remaining age groups, Queensland maintained a strong presence, with all U14 and U15 Boys and Girls teams finishing on the podium. This consistent success highlights the strength and depth of the Queensland beach volleyball pathway.



Australian Junior Volleyball Championships (AJVC)

Queensland travelled to Adelaide in July to compete in the Australian Junior Volleyball Championships, entering six teams across the U19, U21 and U23 age groups.

Queensland achieved strong results across the tournament, highlighted by a gold medal

in the U19 Men's division. The program also secured three silver medals in the U21 Women, U23 Women and U21 Men divisions, showcasing Queensland's ability to consistently perform at a high level across multiple age groups.

These results reflect the continued growth and competitiveness of Queensland's junior indoor volleyball pathway on the national stage.



Australian Sitting Volleyball Championships

For the first time, Queensland entered two teams into the Australian Sitting Volleyball Championships that were held in early December as a curtain raiser to the Australian Volleyball Schools Cup.

Both teams battled hard across the 2-day competition playing teams from around the country. Our Queensland Maroon and White teams both narrowly went down in their Semi-Finals and ended up facing off in the bronze match. Queensland Maroon came through victorious claiming the bronze medal with the white team finishing close behind in 4th. A huge thank you to Sonia Stamenkovic and Brisbane Volleyball Club for their continued support with equipment, training venues and their time and dedication that went into supporting these athletes.

Pathways Report

Australian Youth Volleyball Championships (AYVC)

In 2025, the Australian Youth Volleyball Championships were held in Perth, marking the first time since 2010 that the event has been hosted in Western Australia for indoor volleyball.

Queensland sent a delegation of 20 teams, 200 athletes, 44 coaches and 5 support staff, representing the largest touring groups in the competition.



Queensland delivered an exceptional performance across the tournament, culminating in a dominant finals day. The state claimed gold medals in all five boys divisions and added a gold medal in the U16 Girls division.

This outstanding result secured Queensland's 13th consecutive President's Cup, further reinforcing the program's sustained excellence and national leadership in youth indoor volleyball.

Queensland Pirates – Australian Volleyball Super League (AVSL)

Following a historic 2024 season where both the Men's and Women's programs claimed national titles, the Queensland Pirates entered 2025 with strong momentum and high expectations.

As reigning Australian Club Champions, both teams earned the opportunity to compete internationally at the Asian Champions League.



Pathways Report

The Women travelled to the Philippines in April, while the Men competed in Japan in May, gaining valuable experience against high-level international opposition.

The domestic AVSL season commenced with Round 1 in Perth, held alongside the Australian Youth Championships, where the Pirates were well supported by a strong Queensland crowd. Both teams demonstrated consistency throughout the season, qualifying for the Semi Finals. The Women fought hard but fell just short of another Grand Final appearance.

The Men, however, delivered a dominant and undefeated season, not dropping a single match on their way to the Championship. They capped off a remarkable campaign by defeating the Perth Steel in the gold medal match to reclaim the national title.

Volleyball Queensland extends its sincere thanks to all players, coaches, support staff, officials, sponsors and supporters who contributed to another outstanding year for the Queensland Pirates program.

Pirates Camp

Volleyball Queensland continued to support grassroots and pathway entry opportunities through the delivery of two Pirates Camps in 2025, held in January and July.

These camps are designed as introductory and development experiences, providing athletes with their first exposure to the Queensland pathway in a fun, engaging and supportive environment.

The camps focused on fundamental skill development, game understanding and fostering a positive connection to the sport, while introducing athletes to the standards and expectations of representative volleyball.

Both camps were well attended and played an important role in engaging new athletes, supporting retention and building the foundation for future pathway involvement. Volleyball Queensland thanks all coaches and staff involved in delivering these important development opportunities.

Education Report

Referee and Coach Development

2025 saw a continued commitment from Volleyball Queensland to strengthening referee and coach development across all levels of the sport.

With the ongoing growth of volleyball throughout Australia, the demand for knowledgeable and accredited coaches and referees has continued to rise. In response, Volleyball Queensland, in partnership with Volleyball Australia, delivered a range of coaching and refereeing courses throughout 2025 to support this demand.

Online Level 1 courses remained a key entry point for both coaches and referees, offering accessible and flexible learning opportunities. These courses continued to be widely utilised across the state, with a number of Queensland schools again engaging in bulk enrolments to upskill students and develop their internal capacity. The total number of accredited coaches and referees in Queensland at the end of 2025 is summarised in the tables below.

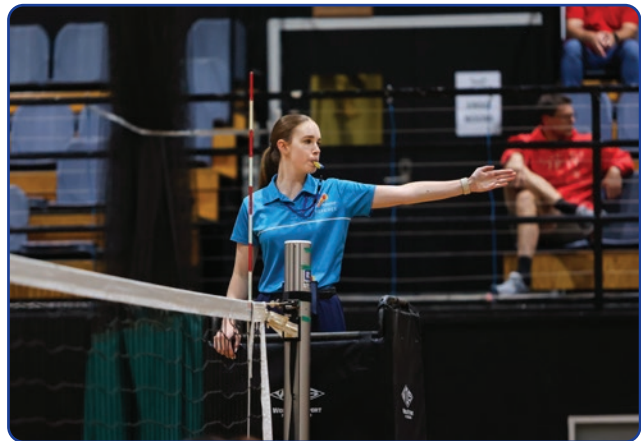

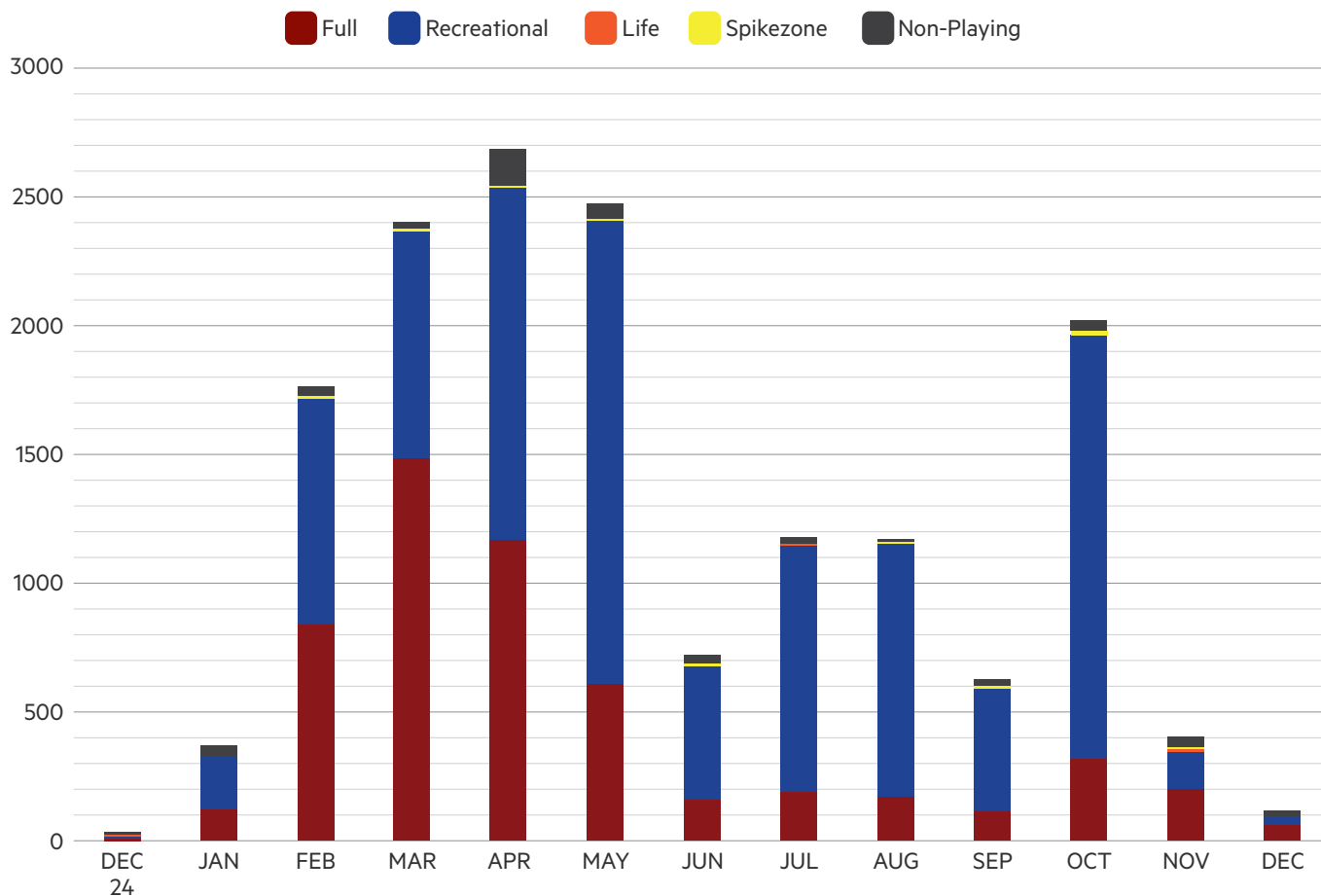

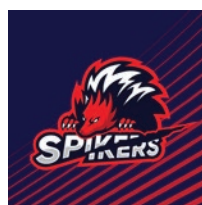
Volleyball Queensland Membership by Month

Notes to the Financial Statements FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2025

The financial statements cover Queensland Volleyball Association Inc. as an individual entity. Queensland Volleyball Association Inc. is a not-for-profit Association incorporated in Queensland under the Associations Incorporation Act (QLD) 1981 ('the Act').

The principal activities of the Association for the year ended 31 December 2025 were focused on increasing participation in all forms of volleyball throughout Queensland.

The functional and presentation currency of Queensland Volleyball Association Inc. is Australian dollars.

1 Basis of Preparation

In the opinion of the Board of Management, the Association is not a reporting entity since there are unlikely to exist users of the financial statements who are not able to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy specifically all of their information needs. These special purpose financial statements have been prepared to meet the reporting requirements of the Act.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

Significant accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and are consistent with prior reporting periods unless otherwise stated.

2 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Income and other income

Grant Income

Grant income is recognised in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income when the entity obtains control of the grant, it is probable that the economic benefits gained from the grant will flow to the entity and the amount of the grant can be measured reliably. When there are conditions attached to grant revenue relating to the use of those grants for a specific purposes it is recognised in the balance sheet as a liability until such conditions are met or services provided. Where the grant is for a specific period of time, it is recognised over that period of time.

Membership and competition fees

Membership and competition fees income is recognised when money is received.

All income is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

(b) Income tax

The Association is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997. The association has availed the benefit of the tax exemptions available under the rules provided in Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment.

(c) Goods and services tax (GST)

Income, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

2 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(c) Goods and services tax (GST)

Cash flows in the statement of cash flows are included on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which is recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is classified as operating cash flows.

(d) Property, plant and equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment.

Items of property, plant and equipment acquired for significantly less than fair value have been recorded at the acquisition date fair value.

Depreciation

Plant and equipment are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the asset's useful life to the Association, commencing when the asset is ready for use.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable asset are shown below:

(e) Financial instruments

Financial instruments are recognised initially on the date that the Association becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

On initial recognition, all financial instruments are measured at fair value plus transaction costs (except for instruments measured at fair value through profit or loss where transaction costs are expensed as incurred).

Financial assets

All recognised financial assets are subsequently measured in their entirety at either amortised cost or fair value, depending on the classification of the financial assets.

(e) Financial instruments

Financial assets

Classification

On initial recognition, the Association classifies its financial assets into the following categories, those measured at:

- amortised cost
- fair value through profit or loss - FVTPL

Amortised cost

The Association's financial assets measured at amortised cost comprise trade and other receivables and cash and cash equivalents in the statement of financial position.

Financial assets through profit or loss

All financial assets not classified as measured at amortised cost or fair value through other comprehensive income as described above are measured at FVTPL.

Net gains or losses, including any interest or dividend income are recognised in profit or loss.

Trade receivables

Impairment of trade receivables have been determined using the simplified approach in AASB 9 which uses an estimation of lifetime expected credit losses.

The amount of the impairment is recorded in a separate allowance account with the loss being recognised in finance expense. Once the receivable is determined to be uncollectable then the gross carrying amount is written off against the associated allowance.

Financial liabilities

The financial liabilities of the Association comprise trade payables and other liabilities.

(f) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

(g) Impairment of non-financial assets

At the end of each reporting period the Association determines whether there is evidence of an impairment indicator for non-financial assets.

2 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(g) Impairment of non-financial assets

Where an indicator exists and regardless for indefinite life intangible assets and intangible assets not yet available for use, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated.

(h) Employee benefits

Provision is made for the Association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to be wholly settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled. Long service leave is recognised after 7 years of service.

(i) Going concern

The Board of Management have prepared the financial statements on a going concern basis, which contemplates the continuity of normal business activities and the realisation of assets and the settlement of liabilities in the ordinary course of business.

3 Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgments

The board of management make estimates and judgments during the preparation of these financial statements regarding assumptions about current and future events affecting transactions and balances.

These estimates and judgments are based on the best information available at the time of preparing the financial statements, however as additional information is known then the actual results may differ from the estimates.

The significant estimates and judgments made have been described below.

Key estimates - fair value of financial instruments

The Association has certain financial assets and liabilities which are measured at fair value. Where fair value has not able to be determined based on quoted price, a valuation model has been used. The inputs to these models are observable, where possible, however these techniques involve significant estimates and therefore fair value of the instruments could be affected by changes in these assumptions and inputs.

Key estimates - property, plant and equipment

Management applies judgement in determining the useful lives, residual values and depreciation rates of property, plant and equipment in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards, including AASB 116. These estimates are based on expected use and wear and tear, and are reviewed regularly.
